TRAINING WITH DETROIT TIGERS

Japanese Team Intrigued By Rich Food, Equipment

LAKELAND, Fla. (AP) — Japanese baseball players, training in Florida for the first time, are intrigued most by the rich food and all the fancy equipment at their fingertips.

The Hanshin Tigers, Japan's Central League champions, arrived in Lakeland Saturday night. Immediately they started diving into plates full of pancakes, bacon and eggs and buying everything in sight.

As guests of Detroit Tigers, whom they'll play in two exhibition games next weekend, the

Japanese were treated to the same food served their hosts — and they weren't issued chop sticks.

"They had a breakfast of pancakes, eggs, bacon and sausage," said Mel Mardock, head cook of the Tigers' kitchen. "For dinner, they'll have their choice of baked ham, turkey and chicken."

The Hanshin players acted like kids in a toy shop when they saw all the baseball equipment exhibited by the various sporting goods concerns.

"Biggest day I ever had," said one major representative. "I sold 22 gloves and 21 pairs of shoes."

JOIN IN DRILLS

The 26 visiting Japanese players joined the host Detroiters in calisthenics, batting and pitching drills. Some of the players immediately caught the eye of

the Detroit manager, Bob Schefling.

One of these was Yoshio Yoshida, five-foot-five shortstop built along the lines of the former Yankee Phil Rizzuto. "He does everything—field, run and hit," said Schefling.

The Detroit skipper also had praise for two Hanshin pitchers — Minori Yurayama, a 25-game winner, and Nasaki Koyan, who won 27 games last season. "They could play in the majors," Schefling said.
