Be Christian 7 Days A Week Speaker Tells Laymen's Meet

KEENINGTON — Anglican Laymen of the Diocese of Prince Edward Island were guests of the New London Parish Laymen's Association at St. Mark's Hall, Keenington, Thursday evening when Eric G. Freeman of Toronto was guest speaker.

Mr. Freeman is supervisor of the Division of Laymen's Work, Department of Information and Stewardship of the Anglican Church of Canada.

"Every man has a responsibility as a Christian," stated Mr. Freeman, and developing the theme, pointed out that in the organization of Laymen's Work, there is every opportunity to witness for Christ and His Church.

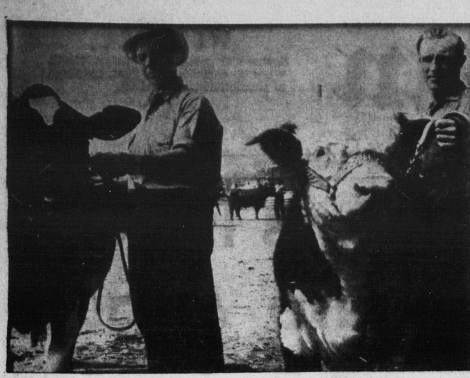
"The clergy cannot be expected to do all the work," the laymen of the church should be prepared to give leadership in the parish, and especially through the Laymen's Association, which, the speaker said, "is a success of your operation is in your leadership."

Mr. Freeman made it clear that being a Christian on Sunday is not enough. "Being a Christian is seven days a week operation," he said, and the idea must be sold that the Laymen's Association is for a special purpose, that of learning to be a Christian in the world seven days a week.

MUST TEACH CHILDREN
Finally the supervisor told the meeting, "we must teach our young people that God is really here with us, all the time, because that is the one thing that they do not know for sure."

In the discussion that followed, a number of the men voiced their opinions on various aspects of the Laymen's work as a churchman, and it was agreed that it is the keen interest of the few that counts in any undertaking.

The speaker was introduced by Rev. G.S. Tanton. Also speaking briefly were Canon J.R. Davies, Mayor T.E. MacNutt and others. John Pillman, president of the Deany Laymen's Association, presided and thanked the speaker. Lunch was served by the hosting group.

Farm Films Showing Held At Alberton

ALBERTON — Farmers and others interested in the West Prince Development Foundation, attended the showing of two excellent movies in Alberton Will Hall Thursday evening.

Charles Thibert, fieldman for the West Prince Development Foundation, procured the first film on "The Scientific Growing and Production of Tomatoes" from the H.J. Heinz Company.

One of the world's largest tomato processing plants, located in Leamington, Ont., was the setting for the highly-educational film which was in color.

J.W. Don Campbell of the West Prince Development Foundation acted as chairman for the evening and stated that 25 farmers are taking part in the local experimental growing of 30 acres of grain corn, 10 acres of sugar beets, one and a half acres of tomatoes, five acres of soy beans and some burley tobacco.

Rev. Gerald Steele, also an active promoter of the experiment, described events leading up to the formation of the foundation which is recognized by the provincial department of agriculture and ARDA. Father Steele paid tribute to C. R. Leard, secretary of West Prince Board of Trade and Rev. David MacDonald, for the work they have done with the foundation.

"We have to explore the development of products of farming and fishing," Father Steele concluded with noting that the recent Prince County agricultural survey gave some encouraging words on the growing of sugar beets.

The second film dealt with the growing and development of grain in various parts of the world. Appreciation was expressed to Mr. Thibert for obtaining the films and to Rev. Leard for operating the projector.

Restrictions On Smoking Ads. Urged

The federal government will be asked by the Canadian Home and School Federation to restrict cigarette advertising on radio, television and in all other forms of public communication.

At the last session of the federation's six-day annual meeting here, delegates approved a resolution asking the federal government to "curtail and restrict advertising of cigarette smoking," and recommending that the food and drug administration label cigarette packages with warnings of the hazards of smoking.

The resolution said "cigarette smoking has been shown to be an important factor contributing to the development of lung cancer."

The annual convention decided to ask for restriction of cigarette advertising because "a very effective campaign is being waged by advertising to increase the consumption of cigarettes in spite of their harmful effects."
