

MISCELLANEOUS.

The yellow fever seems to be checked at Memphis.

All of the New York hotels are full of guests, a sure index of good times.

The Guelph Herald, one of the oldest and staunchest Conservative newspapers in Canada, now issues two editions daily, one at half-past three and one at half-past four, p. m. The Herald, under its present management, is one of the liveliest and best conducted papers west of Toronto.

Her Majesty Queen Victoria has intimated that the sale of the photographs of the so-called fashionable beauties has her severe displeasure, and an earnest attempt is to be made to limit the abuse. The principal sinners, says an English weekly, are ladies of the aristocracy, and the remedy lies in Her Majesty's own hands.

Yesterday was a glorious day for America. We did not win a victory on field or flood, but we exported to Europe from New York alone, two hundred thousand bushels of grain, twenty thousand barrels and bags of flour, twenty-five hundred bales of cotton and thousands of tons of meats, cheese, butter and other provisions.—Herald, 14th.

Some time next November will take place at Pompeii a commemoration which will have a world-wide interest and renown. The eighteenth centennial of the destruction of Pompeii and Herculaneum by an eruption from Mount Vesuvius, is to be celebrated. The festival will be of a scientific nature, and a number of Italian and foreign archaeologists are expected to take part in it.

Two very singular things on the same subject appear in late English papers. One is a letter in the Times pointing out that the only hope for the cotton trade of England is the repeal of the Factory Acts, and the consequent extension of the hours of labour. Another is, a meeting of the Amalgamation Tailors (nine societies no doubt going to make one) at which the Factory Acts were also discussed unfavorably.

The way in which public opinion is manufactured in England concerning the Colonies, may be judged from two incidents. One is that the Times copies an article from the Globe on the supposition that the Globe embodies public opinion. The other is, that the Philadelphia correspondent of the same journal cables, actually cables, that the result of the Canadian Tariff has been that prices have all risen and the revenue has decreased!

HORSES FOR BELGIUM.—The export of horses is becoming a profitable trade, affords a good market. The Switzerland recently carried forty saddle-horses to Antwerp, where horses are from 25 to 100 per cent. higher than here, which were sold at a good profit. Not one was lost, though the weather was rough. The cost of transportation is about \$50 per head the duty \$6. The Duke of Flanders is said to have paid 6,000 francs for an American horse of recent importation that pleased his fancy.

Australia is a great market for British manufactures. Including New Zealand, the population in 1871 was 2,515,511, yet it took \$717,077,195 worth of British manufactures in 1877, or £8 6s. per capita. This is a greater per capita than any other British colony, although India took \$213,302,365 in value, but which would be \$1 per inhabitant of that vast empire. Canada takes \$10 per capita, the Cape of Good Hope \$10.50 and the West Indies \$10. Evidently Australia is destined in a few years to be England's largest market. England exported to all her colonies in 1877 no less than \$420,000,050 in manufactures.

The new tariff is rising up and bearing witness against Sir Richard Cartwright in Napanee. The Beaver says that Taylor & Sanderson's woollen mills will be in full operation by the end of September. On last Thursday morning three car loads of machinery, the last to be imported, arrived at the G. T. R. station. Other machinery has been ordered from Galt, and will be on hand in a few days. Messrs. Twomey Bros. contemplate the erection of a new woollen mill on the river bank next to Green's furniture factory. The timber is already on the ground, the machinery has been purchased, and a vigorous pushing of the work will be made. The stock-books for the establishment of the glass factory were opened on Thursday afternoon last and a large amount subscribed. It is expected to be in operation in a short time.

Dr. Fripson has succeeded in obtaining from organic substances present in fresh water a new and interesting product which he has named "characene." It is a kind of camphor which gives to the algae in general, and to the waters in which they grow, that peculiar marshy odour which has hitherto been thought to be one of the results of vegetable decomposition, but which really arises from a substance produced by certain plants while they are alive and vigorous. As yet, few of its properties have been definitely ascertained.

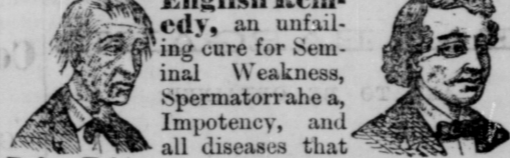
