NEWS TOPICS OF WEEK

Important Events Which Have Occurred During the Week.

The Busy World's Happenings—Carefully Compiled and Put Into Handy and Attractive Shape for the Readers of Our Paper—A Solid Hour's Enjoyment.

TUESDAY. Coal may advance another 50c in price September 1.

Henry J. Hunter, aged 47, was found dead in his room.

Two Allied air squadrons attacked Constantinople on Wednesday night.

The Municipal Council of Paris has agreed to present a Sword of Honor to Marshal Foch.

Mrs. George Terry died of a fractured skull, the result of falling down the cellar stairs at her home in Chatham.

Seven fishing boats have just been sunk by one submarine near the coast of Holland.

It seems likely that the Congress of the United States will pass a nation-wide prohibition measure to take effect on July 1, 1919.

Export of Canadian silver coin, silver bullion and fine silver bars is prohibited, except under license issued by the Minister of Finance.

James B. Wilson, 17 years chief engineer at the Ontario School for the Blind at Brantford, died after one day's illness of appendicitis.

The attendance for the opening day of the Exhibition at Toronto was 33,400.

Dr. W. G. McCormack, Toronto, is held by the police, on a charge of criminal negligence.

The steamer Eric, 600 tons, has been sunk by shell fire, presumably by the same submarine which sent four fishing schooners to the bottom on Sunday of Miquelon.

The British third and fourth armies suffered casualties estimated at about 23,500 between Aug. 21 and 25.

Yesterday was Children's Day at the Toronto Exhibition.

York Township tax rate was struck, and is the lowest in the county.

Fire Chiefs for Canada opened their annual convention at the Exhibition grounds.

Sir John Eaton started the "Sailors' Week" campaign with a subscription for \$50,000.

A double drowning is feared to have taken place in the St. Lawrence river, near Brockville.

First Assistant Secretary of War Crowell has been made United States Director of Munitions.

The safe arrival in the United Kingdom of a large number of Canadian troops is announced.

Three arrests were made in connection with the attempted robbery of the Spadina Cafe, Toronto.

Lt.-Col. John White, of Woodstock, a prominent merchant and former mayor, died on his way down town.

Immigration to the United States during the past year was less than during any year since the Civil War.

Hon. Dr. Beland was given a great welcome at Sherbrooke, where he gave three addresses at the Exhibition.

A conference was held at Halifax by the Premier and members of the Governments of the Maritime Provinces.

An official statement issued in Tokio attributes the rice riots to anger of the people at the extravagance of the rich.

The first hospital special train, conveying thirty-three invalid soldiers to their homes, is to leave Kingston to-morrow.

Licence Inspector Fisher seized a still, in operation on a kitchen stove, in a Gravenhurst house, together with a quantity of whiskey.

John McKishnie, father of Mrs. Jean Blawie and of Archie P. McKishnie, died at Chatham within a few weeks of ninety years of age.

The Fuel Administration in the United States has called upon the public east of the Mississippi to stop using gasoline for passenger automobiles, motorcycles and motorboats on Sundays until further notice.

THURSDAY. Yesterday was Women's Day at the Toronto Exhibition; to-day is Allies' Day.

Joseph Deacon, K.C., police magistrate of Brockville since 1871, died at the age of 78.

Stationary engineers will protest to the Government against legislation grading engineers.

Toronto telephone girls will apply to the Department of Labor for a Board of Conciliation.

Crooner Winnett, Toronto, at an inquest commented strongly on the practice of children playing on the streets.

An immense deposit of potash sodium sulphate, of many millions of tons, has been discovered north of Maple Creek, Sask.

In Military District No. 3 (Ottawa and Kingston), 766 men took advantage of the opportunity given to defaulters and absconded to report for service.

The C.E.R. commercial telegraphers at Montreal decided to defer the proposed strike for the present, and to present their case to the Federal Government.

Ben Bowman was nominated by the United Farmers of Ontario to oppose the Conservative candidate, B. H. Turner, in the Provincial election for Montserrat Island on Oct. 24.

The Victorian (Australian) Government has purchased 33,000 acres, costing nearly \$2,000,000, for a soldiers' settlement.

The British Board of Agriculture states that the arable area in England and Wales amounts to 12,400,000 acres, an increase of 1,152,000, compared with 1917.

A beautiful woodland lot of forty acres at the confluence of the Grand and Conestogo rivers, was handed over by Mr. Walter J. Snider to Hon. Finlay Macdormid, representing the Ontario Government, to further the policy of conservation and reforestation.

FRIDAY. The annual conference of the A. M. E. is in session.

Vancouver has been made a basic port in the grain business.

About 70,000 people attended the National Exhibition on Allies' Day.
