'Survival Car' Is Displayed

OTTAWA (CP) — Conservative MP Howard Graftey, who is campaigning for legislation to guarantee safer Canadian cars, showed off a "survival car" incorporating the features he wants.

Mr. Graftey, member for St. John's, said the Liberty Mutual Insurance Companies from Boston who designed the car outlined the vehicle's features at a press conference.

The car, a standard North American model, contains 24 design considerations that its designers feel could cut car deaths in half.

"Packaging the passenger" is the basic principle, Frank Crandall, chief engineer for the company, told reporters.

Mr. Graftey has already submitted a brief to the government on traffic deaths and injuries and the measures he wishes taken to improve the situation.

Mr. Crandall estimated the safety features on the latest safety vehicle "might cost a couple of hundred dollars per car."

A reporter noted that the demonstration car, with all its interior protection, cut seat space in the sedan to four people.

"That's right," said Mr. Crandall, "but you need the space if you're going to transport people safely."

He plans to introduce a private member's bill or resolution this fall on the subject if the government doesn't act on his brief.

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Restall Charmed Since Boy By Pirate Treasure Stories

OAK ISLAND, N.S. (CP) — Robert Restall, the 59-year-old adventurer who died in a gas-filled "treasure" pit here Tuesday, sought legendary pirate gold on this island with religious zeal.

He was a stocky man, toughened by years as a steelworker and motorcycle stunt rider. His wiry hair was constantly tousled, his face smudged with the blue clay of the island, his eyes fierce.

He had been charmed by newspaper and magazine accounts of buried treasure since he was a schoolboy in his native Toronto. He first visited this island off Nova Scotia's south shore 45 miles from Halifax in 1955.

Like all others who sought the solution to the Oak Island mystery, he was certain he knew the answers. In his six years here he studied every foot of the one-half-square-mile island. On winter nights, by the light

of a kerosene lamp, he studied records of the sea coast, legends of the islands, ancient charts of Mahone Bay.

When he was a youngster he spent all his money on motor-cycles he used in racing and hill-climbing. This led to his career as a stunt rider and his own show which toured Britain and Europe.

DID DARING ACT — The act was called the "globe of death," two looping motor-cycles. It was while he had the act that he met his wife Mildred in the 1950s.

"I was the leading dancer in a small ballet troupe playing the winter garden in Blackpool when this guy came over wanting girls to pose with his motor-cycles for publicity shots," she said two years ago.

"He made a big hit with my mother, who was an actress, and later, when he wanted me to tour Europe with his motor-

cycles act, she persuaded me to go.

"We were married, oh, so long ago, and that's how I came to Oak Island."

The Restalls and their two sons, Bob, 24, and Ricky, 14, made the island their home for six years. Bob died with his father and two other men in the shaft they hoped would lead them to fortune.

Mildred Restall described their life recently.

"Today we are diggers. Tomorrow we may be broke or we may have a few million dollars. Either way the experience for us will be unique."
