**THE PROVINCIAL CAMPAIGN.**

Meetings at Flat River and Belle River on Tuesday.

The meeting at Flat River on Tuesday was held at one o'clock in the afternoon. It was addressed by Mr. A. A. McLean, David Irving, Alex. Martin, M. P., and Alexander Beaton, supervisor.

There was quite a large gathering of the well-to-do farmers of that section, and the meeting was strongly favorable to Mr. A. A. McLean.

The Belle River meeting was held at six o'clock in the evening. The speakers were A. A. McLean, David Irving, Malcolm H. McDonald, Arthur Peters, M. L. A., Alexander Martin, M. P., and L. E. Prowse, M. L. A., in the order in which the names are given.

The building was, filled and the meeting was orderly with the exception of interruptions by two Government officials under the influence of liquor. These were publicly rebuked by Mr. A. Peters and others.

The meeting was highly favorable to the Conservative candidate, and Belle River promises to be a banner poll for McLean on the 13th.
