LECTURE.—An interested and appreciative audience assembled in A. O. H. Hall to deliver his lecture on "Some of Canada's Early Heroes." The subject was delivered in the form of a "talk," and the eloquent gentleman handled it in a very agreeable manner. The lecturer began by giving a short sketch of the career of Champlain, the real discoverer of Canada, with his twofold purpose of exploration and the spread of the gospel. His zeal, courage, and the arduous trials were dwelt upon at length. The great De Bebrevoix was next referred to, and an account given of his great labors amongst the savages in the cause of the gospel, his zeal, courage, and the arduous trials were dwelt upon at length. The career of the energetic, persevering and youthful LaSalle, the discoverer of the great Mississippi, his voyage down the great highway and subsequent voyage to the Gulf of Mexico, and his death, were graphically portrayed. Frontiers and other important routes, explorers and pioneers in Canada's history were also mentioned in a very interesting and most fascinating, and well repaid those who attended. A vote of thanks was moved by Mr. W. J. O'Reilly, seconded by Rev. A. McAlay, and tendered the eloquent lecturer.

ZION CHURCH. On Sunday morning at Zion Church, the Rev. David Stewart delivered a sermon from the text: "I and some evangelists."—Eph. iv. 2. He first showed that a four-fold ministry was indicated by the verse—that of apostles, prophets, evangelists, and pastors and teachers. The first two were extraordinary and were used in founding the church. The last two were ordinary. Evangelists and pastors differed from each other in two ways: the evangelist was a herald and itinerant, while the pastor had a fixed abode and was a teacher. The reverend gentleman then went on to show that evangelists were a recognized part of the church in Bible times, and that the great moral reforms of history were due to their work. He instanced Martin Luther, Wesley and Whitfield in times past, and Moody, McNeil and Mills of the present age. He referred particularly to the moral degeneracy of the people in England and Scotland in the 18th century, and the uplifting that resulted from the labors of John Wesley and George Whitfield. The sermon was well and forcibly delivered and created a good impression on the congregation.

Weather Bulletin. Toronto, April 17, 10 a. m. Fair, not much change in temperature.

WHERE THE STANLEY OUGHT TO BE. Sir,—Our Government at Ottawa will surely see soon that this is the place for winter communication. Since the first of March, there has not been ice enough in the Gulf here to stop any steamer. If we had such a severe winter the steamer Stanley would have made regular crossings except on storm days. Since the 22nd of March the strait has been as clear as in summer. There was only lolly that it was almost impossible for the ice boats to get through—no heavy ice to enable the men to get out and to let their boats along. Consequently, the ice boats could not make regular crossings and the mails were ordered away from here, and how have we got our mails since? Every body knows. If it were not for the boats, we would have to have run by every five days since the 1st of March, and since the mails were removed from here the boats on the New Brunswick side has all passed away, and a sea-land route is being made. There is all clear. The board ice here never leaves until it melts away. If the Stanley had come up here when she was in Charlottetown and run into the board ice, so that it would have gone out, the mails could have been carried with a sail-boat. That, Mr. Editor, will show the public where the Stanley should be. Here she could make hourly trips, instead of being drifting about in the heavy ice, in danger of being smashed to pieces, which she would have been long ago if it were not for her able and experienced captain.
