ABOUT POULTRY

The Preservation of Eggs.

A fresh-laid egg is never improved by age, but its good qualities may be preserved, if not wholly almost wholly by suitable handling. Eggs should be gathered from the nests at least once every day. An egg may deteriorate for food purposes in one or two ways: It may change unfavorably for food purposes by the beginning of the process of hatching; and it may decay through fermentation started at the pores of the shell. Any moisture on the shell hastens the beginning of decay in that way. An egg may look well when examined by candle light in the usual way, and still be slightly stale inside. Some egg merchants detect whether they are quite fresh-flavoured by breaking some, emptying the contents out and smelling the inside of the shells.

If only a few eggs in the lot are discovered to be stale, that will cast discredit on the whole and very greatly reduce the selling price. Immediately after the eggs are collected from the nests and cleaned, they should be put in a cool place until they can be despatched to market.

Great care should be taken in packing eggs not to use any substance which has in itself a disagreeable odour or flavour, as that will likely be imparted to the eggs. The keeping of eggs packed in musty straw or musty bran will impart that disagreeable quality to them.—Prof. Robertson.

The hen pays for all the work bestowed on her. Eggs are saleable at all times and at good prices, says Poultry Keeper. Wheat, corn, and other foods will pay more at this season if converted into eggs than into any other product, and the farmer does not have to wait for the cash for his work for the hen returns him his outlay every day or nearly so. In those sections where no work can be done in winter the hens can be made to give daily returns of cash in the shape of eggs when all other operations are at a standstill.

The Baltimore Sun gives the following cause for soft-shelled eggs: Egg shells are a lime formation, and a lack of lime as a food ingredient is therefore, one of the main causes. Indigestion is another cause which requires a radical change of diet. Over-fat hens are most apt to be troubled with this disorder. Hens that are frightened or worried by dogs, or otherwise, will

drop soft-shelled eggs. In most cases the cause will suggest the remedy.

In 1896 Great Britain imported 132,450,110 dozens of eggs valued at \$20,365,326. Of this quantity France supplied 32,757,760 dozens, valued at \$6,196,240; Germany 29,304,860 dozens, valued at \$3,806,322, and Russia 24,610,680 dozens, valued at \$3,660,253. The important point to notice in these figures is the great difference in the value of the imports from France and Germany which closely approximate one another in quantity. The average price at the point of export was 15.3 cents per dozen. The selling price in England varies from 31 to 34 cents in winter for French extras to as low as 17 to 18 for Canadian pickled stock.

A novel test is being conducted in Great Britain. In an egg laying competition. All the competing birds are pullets and are being kept under the same conditions and management. Each pen contains four birds and the competition is to last eighteen weeks.—Farming.

The ration fed to cows in full milk at the Nappan Experiment Station is composed of the following: Ensilage 40 lbs.; bran, 3 lbs.; chop (mixed grains, oats and barley), 3 lbs. and pea meal, 2 lbs. At the Nova Scotia Provincial Farm the following is the ration: Ensilage 20 lbs.; clover hay, 10 lbs.; oat straw, 2 lbs.; wheat bran 5 lbs.; and middlings, 2 lbs. per day per 1000 lbs., live weight.
