

# Ottawa Artisans Oppose Lowering Tariffs on Police Reports Asked From City And 'Side

The police departments of Charlottetown and Summerside will be asked to give a monthly report of their activities to the department of Attorney General Alban Farmer.

Speaking in the debate on the draft address in the Legislature yesterday, Mr. Farmer said the two communities are not covered in the report of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police which is tabled annually in the Legislature.

Mr. Farmer said the differences may arise from "individual" viewpoints, the representations made, age and past record. He said he didn't feel that the attorney general's department should interfere with the judiciary and magistrates as the "question of penalties and their imposition is their chief duty."
