IN MEMORIAM

MRS. NEIL MacNEVIN

The death occurred after a short illness at the Prince Edward Island Hospital on May 29th, 1952 of Mrs. Neil A. MacNevin, formerly Jennie Roberta French in her 78th year.

Born at New Glasgow, P. E. I., the daughter of the late Isaac French and Annie Orr, in her early teens she went to Brockton, Mass., where she resided for a period of twenty-two years. While there she married Neil A. MacNevin of Argyle Shore, who predeceased her five years ago. Returning with her husband to Argyle Shore in 1914, she resided there until her death.

The funeral service which was largely attended was held from her late residence at 1:30 P. M. on the 11th of May, 1952, conducted by Rev. Donald Nicholson of Clyde River.

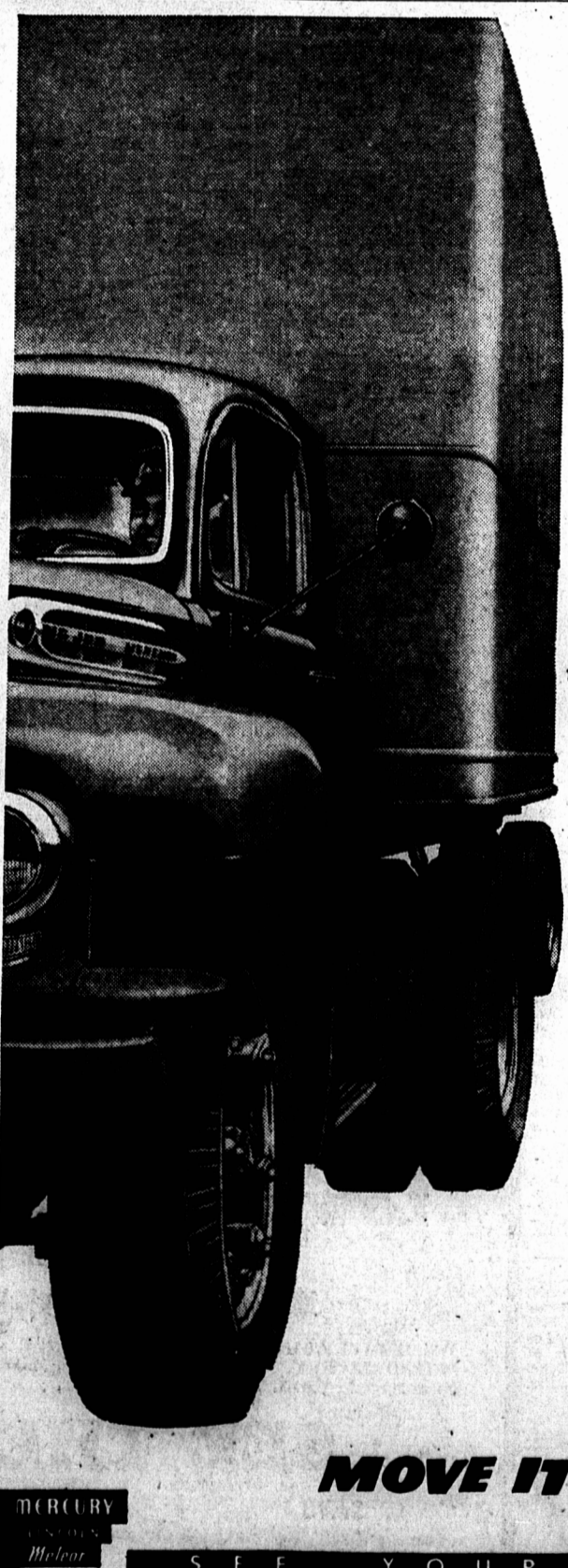
