Official Opening Of
New Prince County
Hospital Yesterday

—Yesterday afternoon under a
warm summer sun and in a beau-
tiful setting provided by newly
landscaped grounds, the cere-
monies were carried out in connection
with the official opening of the
new Prince County Hospital. His
Honour Lieutenant-Governor T.W.L.
Prowse using a silver trowel that
was presented by the architect,
Mr. Leslie R. Fain, applied the
mortar that welded the stone into
position. By coincidence, the mason
on the job, Mr. Gerald McQuaid,
laid the first brick when con-
struction started.

The official opening of the build-
ing was performed by the provin-
cial Minister of Health, the Hon.
A. W. Matheson who cut a ribbon
permitting the doors to be opened
and the main entrance to be used.
Prior to the official opening Mr.
M. F. Schurman, President of M.P.
Schurman Co. Ltd., the building
contractors, laid the building over
to the president of the board of
trustees, Mr. J. F. Arnett, by
presenting him with a large key
which was a replica of the key
of the main door.

Many Inspect Building
After the ceremonies were con-
cluded the large crowd of people
present viewed the hospital cor-
ridor through the building cor-
ridor and its ultra-modern facilities.
Nurses were detailed to explain the
features of the building to visitors.
The members of the Okto Club
served tea. It is expected that the
transfer of patients from the old
hospital will commence today.

Dr. John R. MacNeill spoke on
behalf of the medical staff and
compared the state of medicine
forty years ago when the hospital
was first opened with conditions
of today. He said that a hospital is
one of the most vital necessities
of life today.

Mr. Gordon Hughes, representa-
tive of the federal Department of
Health and Welfare, Ottawa, re-
presented the Minister of Health
the Hon. Paul Martin and con-
veyed Mr. Martin's regrets that he
could not be present. He said that
the federal government had made
a grant of \$141,000 for this new
hospital and the conversion of the
old hospital to be used for the
chronically ill. Mr. Leslie Fain,
the architect, spoke briefly exten-
ding his congratulations to the
people of the county.

Before presenting the key to the
hospital, Mr. M. F. Schurman said
he wished to take the opportu-
nity of thanking the building com-
mittee, the trustees and everyone
who assisted in helping to carry
this hospital to a successful con-
clusion. He said it was a pleasure
to work with the board and their
cooperation had greatly assisted
the contractors. He said he wished
to thank particularly some mem-
bers of the board who had retired
from their position and he
mentioned, Mr. W. E. Darby who
had been president of the board,
Mr. J. Henry Gaudet, who was
chairman of the building com-
mittee during most of the construc-
tion and Mr. M. L. Bradshaw, who

Sessions were held all day
yesterday and last evening at the
Knights of Columbus Home, Sum-
merside, in connection with the
29th annual convention of the
Catholic Women's League of Prince
Edward Island. His Excellency
Bishop James Boyle celebrated the
convention Mass in the Chapel of
St. Mary's Convent at eight o'clock.
Rev. Joseph MacLeod and Rev.
Francis MacDonald assisted his
Excellency.

Bishop Boyle spoke most ear-
nestly to the large assemblage on
the intention for which he had of-
fered Mass, "Increase of religious
vocations in the diocese."

Mrs. James Pendergast, provin-
cial president, presided at the
business meetings which followed.
The national president, Mrs.
Isabel Hutton of Ottawa, was
present.

Hon. Mr. Matheson
Mr. A. W. Matheson prior to de-
claring the hospital officially open
congratulated the people of the
county on the splendid new hos-
pital they have erected and con-
gratulated those responsible for the
splendid grounds which surround
it. He said that this hospital will
serve Western Queens County as
well as Prince County. He said
that the final amount which the
provincial government will con-
tribute has not been decided pending
a decision on the use that the
old hospital will be put to.

He pointed out that hospitals are
having an ever increasing main-
tenance problem and have to com-
bat labor shortages and he ex-
pressed the opinion that too many
special nurses are required. He
said that hospitals are finding it
more difficult to get student nurses
and some solution to this prob-
lem must be found. He said that
he had made a suggestion some
time ago that courses be started
for pursuing attendants and a com-
mittee is now studying proposed
legislation to make this possible.
