

# Brooklyn Dodgers Win Two Weekend Games; Within One Game Of Series Title

BROOKLYN (AP)—Duke Snider slugged two tremendous home runs Sunday and lifted the inspired Brooklyn Dodgers to within one game of their first world series title on a tinging 5-3 victory over New York Yankees.

Three smart double plays by the Dodger infield helped rookie Roger Craig and workhorse Clem Labine as the Yanks mounted threat upon threat in the fifth game.

Sandy Amoros thrilled the happy throng of 36,796, a record series crowd for Ebbets Field, by smashing a two-run homer over the right-field barrier on a 2-1 pitch by loser Bob Grim in the second inning.

Then Snider took over to send the statistics crew thumping madly through the record books.

**TIES HOMER RECORD**

The Duke led off the third with a long drive over the right-field fence for a 3-0 lead. After the Yanks got one run back in the fourth, Snider again ripped into a Grim pitch and sent it sailing over the scoreboard in right field.

Snider's clouts gave him four for the series, tying a record held by Babe Ruth, Lou Gehrig and himself, and boosted his career total to nine series homers, tops in National League history.

Labine, who had shut the door on the Yanks Saturday afternoon, marched from the Dodger bullpen for the fourth time in five days when 24-year-old Craig wobbled in the seventh.

Bob Cerv had just slammed a pinch-hit homer off the railing in the upper left-field stands and Elston Howard had walked on a full count in the seventh when Manager Walter Alton called for Labine.

Nobody was out and the Dodger lead of 4-2 hung in danger as Labine warmed up quickly and then

made Irv Noren hit into his second double play of the afternoon.

The sigh of relief sounded like the air oozing out of a thousand slow leaks as Labine grabbed Gil McDougald's smash to the box and threw him out to end the inning.

But the Dodgers still weren't out of the woods. Yogi Berra hit a lead-off homer over the right-field screen and the potential tying run was at the plate in the person of Joe Collins who had belted two homers in the opening game.

Collins took Labine to 3-2 and then went down swinging. Eddie Robinson lashed a long single to the right-field corner and manager Casey Stengel sent in Tommy Carroll to run for the slow-footed Robinson.

Once again Labine faced a crisis. But he made Billy Martin bounce into a clinching double play on a hopper to Jackie Robinson. Then he blew down the side in order in the ninth, all on infield outs.

day's sixth game, back at the Yankee Stadium where the series will be concluded.

Backed to the wall, a strange and unfamiliar location for the Yanks who haven't lost a series since 1942, Stengel picked left-handed Whitey Ford, first game winner, to pitch today's "must" game.

Alston was undecided between Karl Spooner, the rookie left-hander who showed brilliant stuff on relief in the second game, and Don Newcombe, the jumbo sized right-hander who won 20 in the regular season but lost the series opener.

In the excitement about Labine's strong finish and the homers by Snider and Amoros, it was easy to overlook the stout-hearted pitcher by Craig.

Craig, moved up from Montreal July 16, survived numerous Yank spurts until Alton finally decided to lift him in the seventh. Time after time he went 3-2 on hitters, trying to get them to go for his low-breaking stuff. Usually they did.

**OUT OF TROUBLE**

The Yanks got to Craig in the fourth for one run on Berra's single off the scoreboard, a walk to Eddie Robinson and Martin's scoring single into left. Just when it seemed he was tottering, the gangling youngster made pinch-hitter Bill Skowron left a pop foul to Roy Campanella and retired Grim, his pitching rival, on a soft fly to Peevce Reese.

The Brooks' third double play on Martin in the eighth was their 10th of the series, tying a record held by the 1924 Washington Senators and the 1951 Yankees.

The Dodger sluggers now have hit nine world series homers, breaking their own record of eight from a National League club set in 1953. They're only one short of the American League mark of 10.

## Local Nomads Edged 3-2 By New Glasgow In Rugby

Old rivalries were renewed on Saturday when the New Glasgow Grads played the Charlottetown Nomads in the first game of the newly formed Maritime Rugby Football League. In a gossy fought, hard hitting but clean game the Charlottetown team was defeated by a score of 3-2. It was a game where the team with one chance took it and defeated the team which failed to take advantage of a number of opportunities to score.

The game was played at New Glasgow. The Charlottetown kicked off and for the first few minutes penned the Grads in their own half of the field. Some excellent kicking by the New Glasgow backs relieved the pressure and they in turn took

up the attack. Despite being outweighed by some 100 pounds in the scrum the Charlottetown forwards were obtaining a good share of the ball. Unfortunately the backfield were not combining as well as could have been expected and scoring threats failed to materialize. Two beautifully taken penalty kicks by Dave MacLeod relieved the pressure on the Nomads and play again moved into the New Glasgow territory. From a scrum, the New Glasgow backs obtained the ball and a clean backfield movement over for a try. The attempt at goal failed. Play swung back and forth, a number of loose passes created dangerous positions for the Nomads but their defences held. Dave MacLeod again relieved the pressure with a fine penalty kick.

In the second half the Nomads came to life and exerted real pressure on the Grads, the ball was kept within a few yards of their line for minutes at a time but they put up a sound defence. Determined runs by Dave Nicholson, Cliff Gillis, Cullen DeLory and Dave MacLeod split danger to the Grads but still these were individualistic, the lack of cohesion

spoilt many opportunities. Joe Coyle took the ball to within inches of the line but every effort to cross failed. Cliff Gillis sustained a cut knee and was removed from the game despite his protests. Dick Carroll was moved from the forward line to the backfield and Charlie Ready joined the forwards.

Soon afterwards a well-taken penalty goal by Spy Ready accounted for two points for the Nomads. The Nomads increased the pressure and Dave MacLeod made two or three scintillating runs which were only stopped yards from the line. Neils Hansen was still obtaining the ball in the scrum. Claud Fields, Aquinas Ryan and Joe Coyle were playing out their stand-in games but the necessary points could not be obtained and the game ended with the play on the New Glasgow five yard line.

Critically speaking it can be said that the Nomads improved as play progressed; the forwards worked well but were not "hungry enough" they will have to work even harder if games are to be won; the backfield showed a lack of cohesion and changes of position within their numbers seem to be indicated. If a few problems can be solved and a few more players obtained this Nomad team will be a real power to contend with. At the moment only a bare minimum number of players are available.

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**Detroit Red Wings In 3-1 Victory Over NHL All-Stars Last Night**

DETROIT (CP)—Detroit Red Wings, looking just as powerful as last season, defeated the National Hockey League's All-Stars 3-1 Sunday night in the ninth annual all-star game.

Rugged little Dutch Reibel with two goals and big Gordie Howe with one looked after the Red Wings scoring and defenceman Doug Harvey of Montreal Canadiens counted the Star's lone goal.

Playing before a crowd of 12,187, the Red Wings set up a two-goal lead in the second period and it wasn't until 16:38 of the final period that Harvey sent a low screened shot past Glenn Hall, Detroit's new rookie goalie. Reibel counted his second in an open net after Terry Sawchuk, last year with the Red Wings and now with Boston Bruins, had been taken from the cage in the final minutes.

In seven previous meetings between the Stanley Cup champion team and the combined first and second all-star aggregation, with added help also from the other clubs, the cup titleholders have won only twice — and the Red

Wings have been the team to turn the trick each time. They also had a draw with the all-stars.

The Red Wings well deserved their win, holding a good edge in play most of the way. They made goals Harry Lumley and Sawchuk save 42 times, compared with 30 saves by Glenn Hall, brought up this season from Detroit's Edmonton farm club of the Western Hockey League.

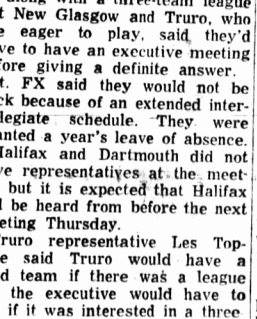

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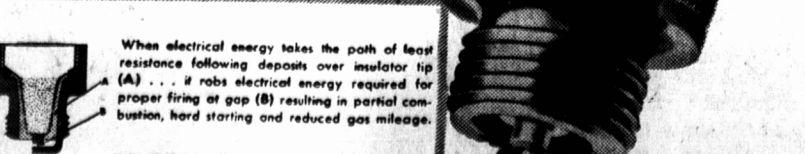


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
