Various Regimes Recalled During The Royal Visit

Mrs. Frank R. Hartz, 8 West Street, Mrs. Bradford W. LePage, 7 West Street, Mrs. George D. DeBlois, 1 West Street, and Mrs. T. L. Prowse, 17 Villca, who reside in Charlottetown are wives of former lieutenant-governors of Prince Edward Island.

The Hartz regime was from 1924-30 and the beautiful Hartz residence "Edgewater" West Street, was used at that time as Government House. For a period, during the latter years of the First World War, Government House was devoted to the use of returned soldiers as a convalescent home.

"Edgewater" burned in 1931. There are now three residences on the property. They are those of Mrs. B.W. LePage, Mr. and Mrs. W.R. Jenkins and Mr. and Mrs. J.C. Montgomery.

Among those entertained by Lieutenant-Governor and Mrs. Hartz were Lord and Lady Willington, Premier Stanley Baldwin and Mrs. Baldwin. These people were in residence at "Edgewater."

Prince George Chavchavadze and Mr. Earl Spicer were guests of Governor Hartz. Sir Henry Wood had sponsored the Russian prince. Mark Hambourg was another internationally known guest who was a guest of the governor.

Mrs. Hartz lives quietly now in retirement with her son-in-law, and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Charles MacKenzie, 5 West Street. This large property is next to the former Hartz property "Edgewater" and is called after the original Hartz home. Number 5 was the former residence of Sir Louis Davies, Chief Justice of Canada, and Lady Davies. For many years it was owned by Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Parkman and now has come into the ownership of Mrs. Hartz and her son-in-law Mr. Charles MacKenzie.

Mrs. Hartz, although in very good health, does not go out in large gatherings and was not present at the Government House afternoon party.

LEPAGE REGIME: Mrs. B.W. LePage is the widow of the Hon. B.W. LePage who died in 1958. Mr. LePage was the lieutenant-governor from 1939-45. Mr. LePage lives with her daughter, Mrs. Lloyd Wonnacott at the family home 7 West Street.

During the LePage regime the Duke of Kent, Princess Alice and the Earl of Athlone, Mr. Malcolm MacDonald and Mrs. Ewen MacDonald (L.M. Montgomery, a kinswoman) were among the guests at Government House.

Mr. and Mrs. LePage attended the coronation of King George VI. Mr. LePage and the late Mr. W. Chester S. McLure (the latter for thirteen years a Federal member) were first cousins, their mothers being the Wonnacott sisters. Mr. LePage is a descendant of Professor Thomas LePage, known as the Island minister.

The Prince Edward Island LePages and the Toronto LePages are cousins. Mrs. LePage leads a very quiet life now enjoying the company of her son, daughter, daughter-in-law, and grandchildren. Mrs. LePage did not attend the garden party.

DeBLOIS REGIME: Mrs. George D. DeBlois lives at 1 West Street. Mr. DeBlois was appointed to the governorship by the Hon. R.B. Bennett. Mrs. DeBlois' daughter, Mrs. J.A. Likely, Mr. Likely and four sons live at 3 West Street in a house adjoining that of Mrs. DeBlois. Her son Mr. Robert DeBlois, Mrs. DeBlois and young daughter live at 22 West Street. Mrs. DeBlois is very much interested in painting as a serious hobby. She and Mrs. J.A. Fraser have just returned from England and Italy where they had the pleasure of joining some sketching classes. Mrs. DeBlois' summer home at Tracadie is the setting for the luncheon in honor of Her Majesty and Prince Philip. Mrs. DeBlois was a luncheon guest.

Mr. and Mrs. DeBlois entertained the Queen's parents in 1939 at Government House at which time there was a Garden Party. Many of the guests attending

the garden party in 1899 were also guests in 1959. Mrs. DeBlois and members of her family attended the garden party.

PROWSE REGIME: The Hon. T.W.L. Prowse and Mrs. Prowse live at 17 Villa. During their regime at Government House the Queen (then Princess Elizabeth) and Prince Philip visited the province. The Earl and Countess of Home were also among the notables who visited at Government House.

Mr. and Mrs. Prowse attended the Coronation Ceremony of Elizabeth II in London in 1953. They also attended the Opening of the Canadian Parliament in 1957 which was opened by the Queen.

Mrs. Prowse is still very active in church and community life and was a guest at the Garden Party. Mr. and Mrs. Prowse were presented to Her Majesty at HMCS Queen Charlotte.
