

Stamps Top Blue Bombers

CALGARY (CP) — Calgary Stampede turned back Winnipeg Bombers 14-6 before 20,000 fans Monday to ensure themselves a berth in the Western Final Conference post-season playoffs.

Touchdowns by flanker Robby Taylor in the second quarter and by fullback Earl Lannford in the final quarter provided the margin of victory.

The result left Stampede with 10 points, fourth quarter first-place British Columbia Lions and five ahead of the Bombers, and the Edmonton Eskimos 10-4 champions. The Bombers 10-4 fourth place have only two games to play, both against the Lions.

Saskatchewan's Roughriders, who lost 20-12 to Lion Saturday in Vancouver, are one point ahead of the Bombers and have a game in hand.

Halfback Larry Robinson converted both touchdowns for Calgary while George Fleming, the WFC's leading scorer, kicked two field goals and a punt for the Bombers. Jack Deveau added the other point in the final quarter.

Winnipeg led 3-0 at the end of the first quarter, with the Stampede jumping ahead 7-3 at the half. The Bombers tied the score in the third quarter but dropped behind 13-10 in the final 15 minutes and never could catch the Stampede.
