Agree On Economic Aid Plan For Asian Countries

10,500 Homes In Winnipeg Already Flooded

By R. J. ANDERSON WINNIPEG, May 19 — (CP) — McGillivray Dike tonight was holding — precariously. Behind it were 2,000 South Winnipeg homes.

In danger directly to the north — protected only by two high railway embankments — are the wealthy residential districts of River Heights and Crescentwood.

1. The level of the Red at Winnipeg dropped a little more than a half-inch at 4 p.m. C.D.T. — from 30.3 feet where it had held for 21 hours to 30.25.

2. No new area in greater Winnipeg was flooded.

3. The Red south of the international boundary was sharply down and there was a tiny drop at the flooded Canadian border town of Emerson.

Four Barges Blow Up At South Amboy

SOUTH AMBOY, N. J., May 19—(AP)—Four explosive-laden barges blew up at the South Amboy docks tonight and police reported several dead and close to 300 injured.

Fierce fires broke out at the Pennsylvania Railroad docks on Raritan Bay.

Store fronts and homes were caved in by the force of the explosion and debris was splattered over a 10 to 12 block area.

Soldiers and police moved into the docks and streets, gaping open after the blast.

Highways leading to the city were congested with traffic and the city was closed off by police.

Debris from the explosion was splattered for 10 to 12 blocks, shattering automobile windshields and window panes in stores and homes.

The blast occurred about 7:25 P.M. at the Pennsylvania Railroad shipping docks.

Food Rationing Controls In Britain Are Eased

LONDON, May 19 — (CP) — Britain's food rationing controls were eased today but there was bad news along with the good — Dr. A. J. Murchison announced there will be no more points rationing, which means a free sale of certain foods like canned meats and fruits.

Canada To Fill U. K. Cheese Contract; Boost In Butter Surplus Seen

OTTAWA, May 19 — (CP)—Agricultural economists say another year of butter surpluses is in the making this year unless wider domestic and export outlets are found for steadily-increasing production.

This estimated increase from about 330,000,000 pounds of butter and 118,000,000 pounds of cheese produced last year results from a climb of 12 per cent to 17,000,000 in fluid milk output.

With the export outlook for Canadian fluid milk poor, the economists believe the increase will go into bigger production of cheese and butter.

The estimated production of 125,000,000 pounds of cheese will mean that Canada should with "little difficulty" fulfill the 25,000,000-pound Anglo-Canadian cheese contract, say the economists, but the expectancy of increased butter presents a totally different problem.
