**Big Parade Today To Open S'ide Lobster Carnival**

 SUMMERSIDE — The count down to the big Summerside Lobster Carnival opening day parade today continued late last night with Summer's day week in an exuberant carnival spirit in anticipation of the big weekly event that has been in the planning stages for the past 10 months.

The streets are gaily decorated with flags extending along the parade route leading to the stadium which serves as carnival headquarters, and for the service of lobster suppers.

Floata which will appear in the parade today were receiving final touches in a large warehouse on marine wharf from where the parade is scheduled to move off promptly at 1:30 p.m.

At the Stadium, the displays in commercial, industrial, handicraft, fish and wildlife booths were being rapidly completed.

The 17 lovely contestants for the Miss P.E.I. title, Miss "Edwards Island", will Saturday afternoon and were assigned to various floats in the parade. Two Royal Canadian Navy ships with a full complement of sailors were due to dock at marine wharf at 9 a.m.

The feature acts for the Stadium were scheduled to arrive late night, and the carnival midway is located in an area beside the stadium. Carnival visitors and tourists interested in Summerside's most outstanding event of the year were arriving almost continuously.

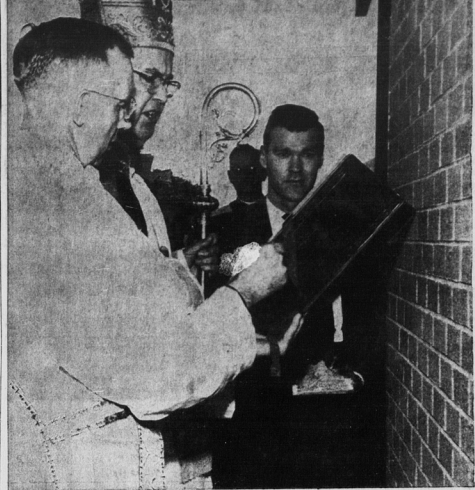
Following treatment by Dr. Roy Kennedy in Tignish he died while being taken to hospital in Summerside.

**President Of ACWW Speaks At WI Reception In Alberton**

ALBERTON — A delightful reception in honor of Mrs. Gerda Van Beekoff, president of the Associated Country Women of the World, and Mrs. James Haggerty, president of the Federated Women's Institutes of Canada, was held in Alberton WI hall Saturday afternoon.

Receiving with Mrs. Van Beekoff and Mrs. Haggerty were Mrs. Lloyd Wilkie and Mrs. J. Lincoln Dewar.

The hall was attractively decorated with flowers. The large covered table was centered with a low bowl of blue and gold flowers flanked on either side with blue and gold lanterns in silver holders. Mrs. Peter F. Gallant and Mrs. Robert Woodside presided at the meeting. The Officers of the district conventions in West Prince assisted in the reception.

Mayor M. R. Leard extended a welcome to the honored guests on behalf of the Town of Alberton.

Mrs. Haggerty, in speaking to the gathering, gave a sketch of her life and told something of the work of the Federated Women's Institutes, making special mention of the way in which, by meeting and working together, the women of Canada and other countries are making a contribution toward world peace.

Mrs. Van Beekoff likened the ACWW to a great umbrella over its member societies. "It is a network of friendship all over the world," she said.

Some 60 women listened with interest as she spoke with first hand knowledge of the work done by the post war days in Holland, then of the work being done by the ACWW in various parts of the world that the officials of world organizations have need of the cooperation of voluntary worldwide groups. She quoted a former president who described ACWW as a monument, a fellowship and a force.

She sketched some of her impressions of the ACWW in Africa, Australia and New Zealand and indicated that in the future she would like to visit countries in Asia and Europe.

She stressed that in this world, where the ACWW women should carry a responsibility for all who are less fortunate than themselves and urged that each should open their hearts and doors to others.

Mrs. Dewar and Mrs. Harold Laird spoke briefly. The speakers were introduced by Mrs. Lloyd Wilkie and thanked by Mrs. Carl Weeks.
