Remains Of Msgr. St. John Arrive In Charlottetown

The remains of the late Right Rev. Monsignor Richard R. St. John, who died in Chicago on February 17, arrived in the city last evening and were conveyed to St. Dunstan's Basilica where they were received by Right Rev. Monsignor Patrick McMahon, accompanied by Rev. P. P. MacDonald, Rev. L. P. Callaghan, Rev. Justin MacDonald and Rev. Reginald Phelan.

Under an escort of Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus commanded by Pilot Alf Kelly, the body was reverently conveyed to the Sanctuary, followed by members of the Knights of Columbus and the immediate relatives of the deceased.

The pall bearers were: Judge Sylvester DesRoches, Mr. Justice Mark R. McGuigan, Mr. A. R. McInnis, Dr. J. E. Blanchard, Mr. Leo Doucette and J. A. MacDonald, Q.C. Fourth Degree Knights constituting the Guard of Honour were Alf Kelly, Pilot, P. A. Murnaghan, Arthur Campbell, Ed. Gallant, Leo Doyle, Thomas Creighton, Frank J. Doucette, Clarence McGuigan, John Doyle, L. O. Kelly and Wilfred Smith.

Following the singing of the "Libera", those in attendance were accorded the privilege of viewing the remains.

Right Rev. Monsignor St. John, who received his last recognition for outstanding service by the Holy See last November was at that time proclaimed Prothronary and general secretary of the Catholic Church Extension Society Born on December 9, 1895, at Souris, P.E.I., he was ordained priest at St. Dunstan's Cathedral Charlottetown on Dec. 21, 1919.

Appointed secretary to Bishop Kelly of Oklahoma in 1924, secretary to the president of Extension in 1928, Director of the Order of Martha in 1929, general secretary in 1937, vice president and general secretary in 1940.

Accompanying the remains were Right Rev. Monsignor W. H. Reid of Chicago and a sister of the deceased, Mrs. Vincent Doucette who flew from Houston, Texas to Chicago and thence to Charlottetown. Pontifical Requiem High Mass will be celebrated at 9.30 this morning at St. Dunstan's Basilica where the body was lying in state overnight.

Child Migration Scheme Studied

LONDON (CP) - Thousands of homeless and orphaned British children would be sent to Commonwealth countries for settlement under a plan soon to be submitted for government approval.

The idea comes from the parliamentary migration board set up last year by the government.

A board official said that if the plan is adopted, children from voluntary institutions and homes run by local authorities will be sent to private homes and institutions in the Commonwealth. Costs of the children's fare, care and education would be met by the receiving country.

Canadian immigration officials said Canada would "consider any child migration scheme carefully."

They said there were two main obstacles to Canada's possible entry to the scheme:

1. Child welfare schemes are under the authority of the provinces and the federal government could not accept the children without the approval of the provinces;

2. Child welfare facilities in Canada "are already bursting at the seams"

OTTAWA (CP) - Broadcasters are becoming concerned about the "something-for-nothing" attitude resulting from give-away shows and are discussing what steps to take.

A. D. Dunton, chairman of the CBC board of governors, said Tuesday in an interview that the CBC and representatives of the private broadcasters will meet here sometime next month to discuss the matter.

T. J. Allard, executive vice-president of the Canadian Association of Radio and Television Broadcasters, said the problem is giving broadcasters increasing concern.

"We have had consultations with the CBC in the past about give-away shows. The something-for-nothing philosophy has gone far too far in many phases of our society."
