Warm congratulations were extended last night to Senator Thomas Joseph Kickham, Souris West, at the big Liberal rally at Souris for the deferred election on Monday July 11. The announcement of Mr. Kickham's appointment to the Senate of Canada was announced early last evening by Prime Minister L. B. Pearson in Ottawa.

Senator Kickham, 65, is the son of the late Richard Kickham and his wife, Alice Landrigan. He is married to the former Mabel MacDonald of North Lake. They have three daughters.

He received his education at Souris West School and at St. Dunstan's University.

Senator Kickham first entered politics actively when he contested a provincial by-election in 1940. The vacancy was created by the death of sitting Liberal member H. H. Acorn, the father of William Acorn whose death in May was responsible for the deferred election which is being held in First Kings. Mr. Kickham lost out in that

The Commons gave final reading to the Canada Assistance Plan bill and sent the range welfare legislation to the Senate.

External Affairs Minister Martin said no spectacular results have been achieved by Chester Ronning's two trips to Hanol.

Immigration Minister Marchand announced major changes in immigration policy to remove discrimination and tighten regulations.

He told the Commons that foreign nationals who entered Canada posing as visitors had until July 25 to apply for resident status.

Opposition MPs complained at length that the press received copies of the new Bank Act Thursday before they did.

Health Minister MacEachen said he was waiting for the "appropriate time" to make a statement on old age pension payment rates.

Labor Minister Nicholson said the International Longshoremen's Union had been made aware last month their dispute would be settled by binding legislation.

The Commons went into committee for clause by clause study of the Canada Assistance Plan.

election of 1947 and he was re-elected in 1947.

The Souris West Liberal resigned his provincial seat to contest the constituency of Kings in the federal election of 1949 and he was re-elected as MP for Kings in 1953. He lost out in 1957 when the PCs swept every Island seat and was not subsequently elected to the House of Commons.

He served on a number of important House of Commons committees during his years in Ottawa, including those on agriculture and fisheries. In his last year as an MP he was sent for a time as an observer to the United Nations in New York.

Senator Kickham operates a large farm at Souris West, just west of the town. For some years he was a livestock and produce dealer in the Eastern Kings area. He was also secretary-treasurer of the Rollo Bay credit union and a director of the P.E.I. Credit Union League.

The new Senator never lost his interest in politics, and he has been one of the most active campaigners for example, in the current political battle in First Kings.

NEW YORK (CP) — U.S. air planes were swept clear of 90 per cent of their winged traffic Friday as an unprecedented mechanics strike closed five major airlines in the United States.

Effects of the strike rippled to foreign shores—Canada, Mexico, Europe, Asia.

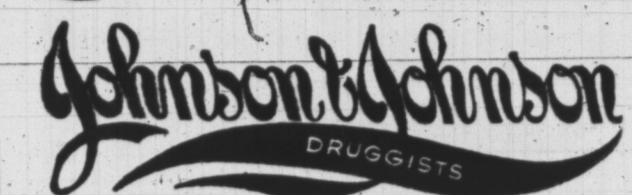

In such important airline hubs as San Francisco, Seattle, Denver, Chicago, Detroit, Cleve-

land, New York, Boston, Washington and Philadelphia, ticket counters of non-affected airlines were inundated by stranded passengers. May air travellers reverted to buses and trains.
