LATE FROM ENGLAND.

HALIFAX, July 15th.—The R. M. Stenstrup, City of Cork, arrived at noon to-day from Liverpool, bringing dates to the 4th inst. We glean the following:

Prince Alfred had completely recovered from the dangerous wound inflicted on him in Australia.

We have had another month of extreme quietude, not to say depression in our different produce markets, extending equally to all descriptions of stocks, shares, and public investments...

Money seems a greater drag to its holders than even produce, and is certainly heavier in stock than any other article; for whilst the latter is unusually small, the amount of bullion and of unemployed capital in the hands of the bankers is extremely large...

The House of Lords has rejected the Suspendory Bill by a majority of two to one. Most people had pretty well made up their minds that the bill would be thrown out...

Castling an eye over the names of the 280 Peers who voted on the occasion, one finds in the minority three Archbishops and eight Bishops. Not a single Bishop voted for the bill. There was a faint hope that the Bishop of St. David's would be found on the Liberal side...

The "Grand Orange Lodge" in Ireland, which is presided over by Lord Enniskillen, forwarded recently an address to the Premier, which speaks with indignation of the attempt of one who was once a Minister of the Crown to pledge Parliament to confiscate the church property of Irish Protestants...
