## At Least 89 Nominated In Newfoundland Vote

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—At least 89 and probably 90 candidates have been named for the Sept. 8 Newfoundland election. That was the count Tuesday night as reports of official nominations continued to trickle in over the province's strike-crippled communication lines.

At the end of the day, chief electors officer R. G. Trickett had heard from all but one of the 41 provincial constituencies. The missing seat, Fortune Bay, was believed to have gone to the Liberals by acclamation. Two other Liberals, including cabinet minister Leslie R. Cur-

ties, were elected when nominations closed Monday. The Liberals under Premier Joseph Smallwood have named 41 candidates—42 if the Fortune Bay seat is counted. One riding, Harbor Main, elects two members.

Progressive Conservatives headed by Dr. Noel Murphy have 38, three more than they ran in the 1962 election.

Calvin Normore, running against the premier in Humber West, is leading three known New Democratic Party candidates. The NDP ran five in 1962 but has never elected a member to the legislature.

Rounding out the list are four independent Liberals and three independents. Nominations reported Tuesday included Premier Smallwood and two of his cabinet ministers—Works Minister James R. Chalker in St. Barne North and Resources Minister William J. Keough in St. George's. Both are opposed by Conservatives and Mr. Keough also faces an independent Liberal.

Also confirmed was the nomination of Mrs. Anita Sulley, named by the Conservatives in White Bay North. She opposes Liberal Edward Roberts, former executive assistant to the premier.

William Rowe, son of Finance Minister Fred W. Rowe, was nominated by the Liberals in White Bay South, opposed by Conservative Cyril Pelley.

The Fortune Bay nominations were held up by a break in telephone lines to that part of southern Newfoundland plus trouble resulting from strikes of telephone and telegraph employees in the province.

Mr. Trickett said all attempts to get the information had failed so far. It is believed Education Minister H. R. Valance Earle is the only nominee there and thus the third Liberal elected by acclamation.

When the House was dissolved Aug. 17 party standings were: Liberals 33, PC six, vacant three—total 42.

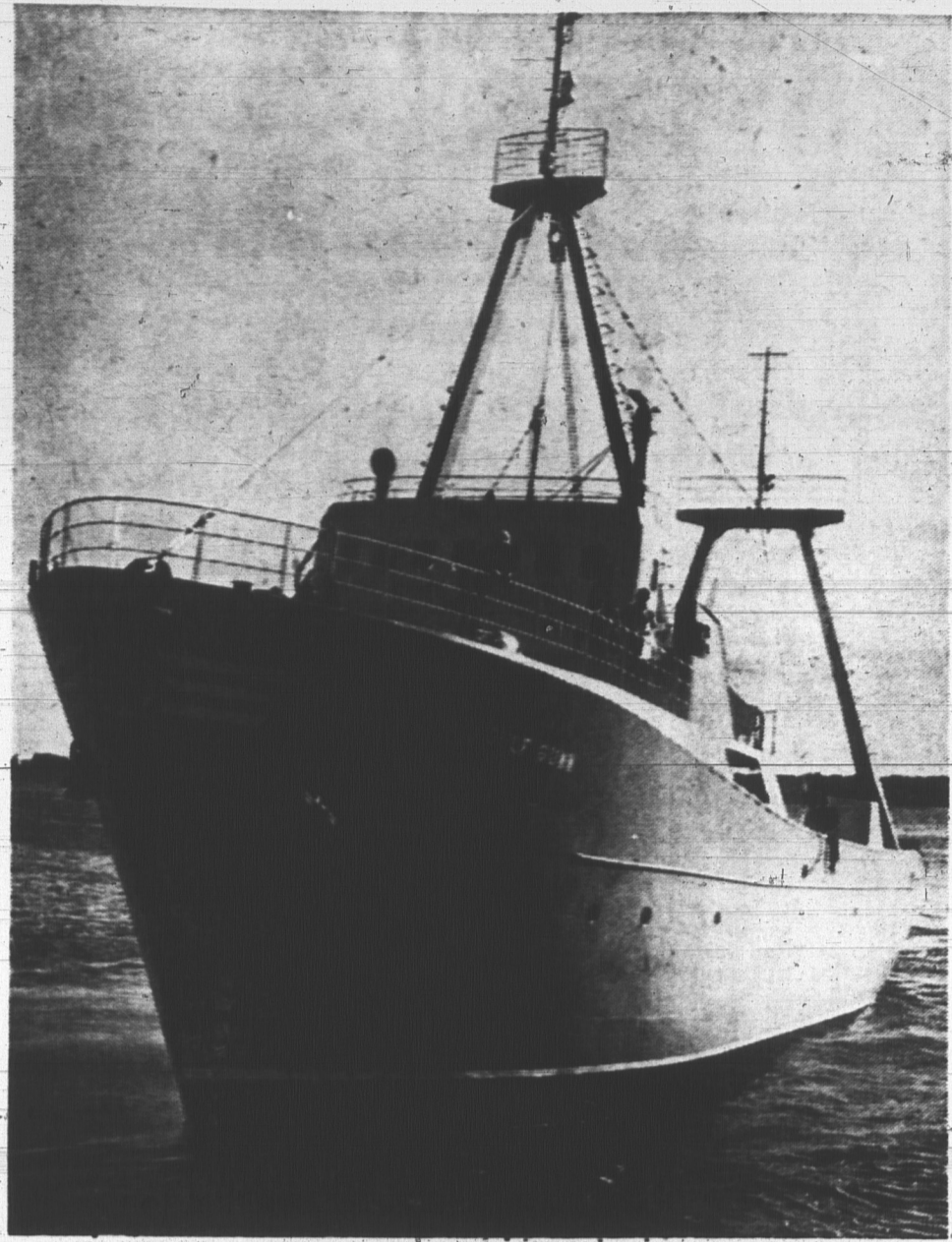

#### DISMANTLED

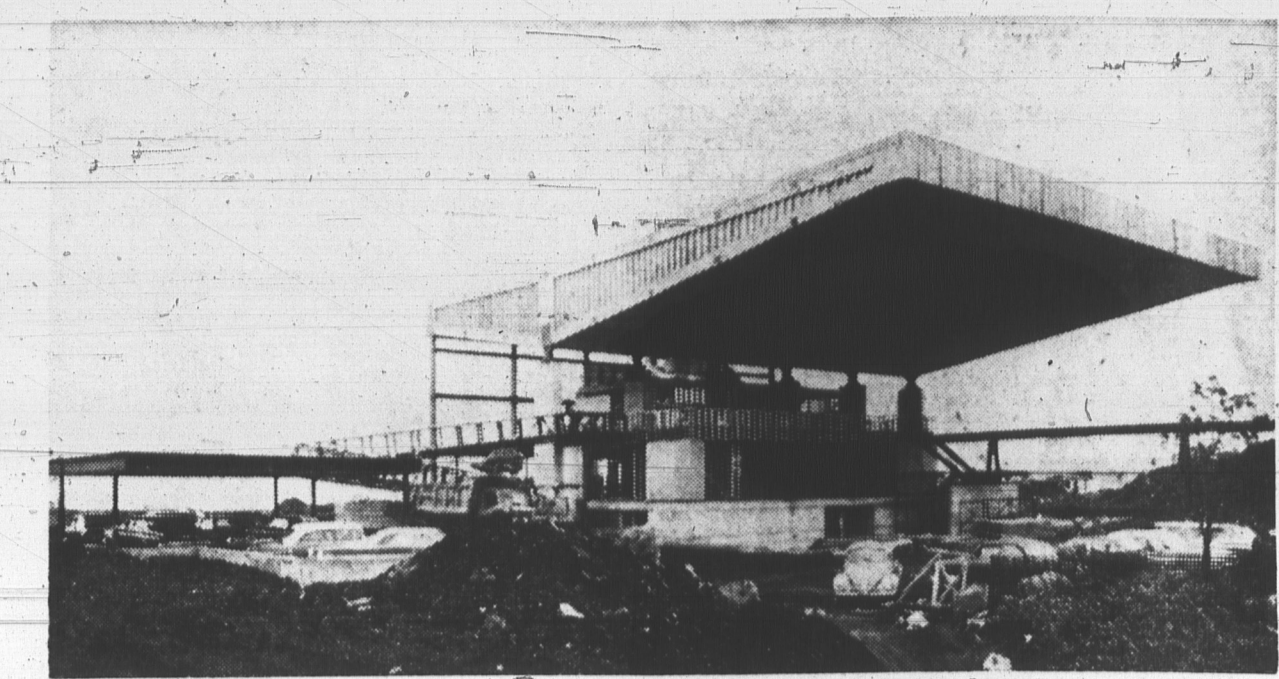

### Text Of Directive

A directive ordering the removal of pickets blocking the CNR ferry terminal at Borden, P.E.I., was drawn up yesterday by the Prince Edward Island Cabinet. The following is a text of that directive:

"The Lieutenant-Governor in Council having declared a state of emergency in the province of Prince Edward Island on August 24th, 1966, and the state of em-

ergency having worsened due to the lack of ferry service at Borden, it is therefore ordered that all CNR employees or other authorized personnel desiring to return to work on the ferries and piers be given unobstructed access to all places and ships within the Borden terminal area.

"It is further ordered in pursuance of section 8 (B) of the Emergency Measures Act, which reads in part 'the minister may authorize the prohibition of persons from entering into or upon any building, structure, premises, land place or area,' that no person shall obstruct or otherwise interfere with the free and

unobstructed passage of employees or passenger vehicles and travel trailers and persons travelling in such vehicles.

"And further take notice that in pursuance of section 12 of said act 'every person who fails to comply with any order or direction of the minister under this act or who contravenes any regulation is guilty of an offence and on summary conviction is liable to a penalty of not more than \$500 or to an imprisonment for a term of not more than six months or to both.'
