NEW YORK

NEW YORK (AP)—The federal reserve board's latest anti-recession move—lowering reserve requirements for banks—gave the stock market only a temporary boost Thursday. Leading issues were down fractions to a point. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks declined 80 cents to \$159.50 with the industrials down \$1.70, the rails down 50 cents and the utilities unchanged.

Most Canadian stocks slid lower. Granby Mining posted a 1/4 gain at the close. Canadian Pacific, Distillers, Seagraves, Dome Mines, Hudson Bay Mining and International Nickel were all lower. Walker-Gooderham, which rose 3/4 during the day, closed unchanged. McIntyre Porcupine pulled back from a 1-point loss to be unchanged.

American exchange prices also declined. Canadian issues were not in demand. Brazilian Traction, Fargo Oil, Richwell and Scurry-Rainbow Oil were all fractionally lower. Other Canadians were unchanged.

The lot, formerly used as a parking area for Brace, MacKay shoppers adjoins the building, which was destroyed by fire two weeks ago, was located. The new owners will now have a building lot extending from Water Street, North to First Street and it is believed a modern business and professional office building will be built on this location shortly.

Will Re-open Drug Store

The name of Foley will continue to be associated with the drug business in Summerside. Hon. E. P. Foley, M.L.A., announced yesterday that he has purchased the stand formerly known as Enman's West Drug Store, and will be open for business there on Monday morning.

Mr. Foley's original store which he operated for 35 years was destroyed in the big Summerside fire that occurred earlier this month. His loss at that time was estimated to be in the vicinity of \$50,000.

Resuming employment with Mr. Foley will be his registered druggist, Ken Linkletter, who has been with the firm for several years, and also his other employees, Shirley Lewis and Robin Lidstone.

The new location of Foley's Drug Store remains on Water Street in a position just one block west of its former location. Under its former management this store operated in conjunction with the Enman's East Drug Store with both stores under the ownership of Henry Wedge and Eric MacKay who will continue to operate Enman's main Drug Store on Water Street opposite Holman's.
