A LETTER from Walla Walla, W. T., to a party in Moncton, says a fever has broken out in the cattle ranches in that section, and the cattle are dropping off like flies. Everything possible is being done to check the disease. "THE NEW BIRTH" will be the theme of discourse by Elder Ira C. Mitchell, at the Christian Church, Upper Great George Street, at 7.30 this evening. The clergy of the different denominations are respectfully invited to attend. THE schr. Notice, at Gloucester, Mass., from the Georges, reports that on January 16 Duncan Campbell, one of the men, was lost overboard. Campbell belonged to Fairfield, P. E. Island, was 20 years of age, and unmarried. ON Monday evening next, Mr. Earle gives his big Concert in Summerside, in the Market Hall. We hope our Summerside, St. Eleanor's and Kensington friends will give the talented musicians who are to assist Mr. Earle a royal welcome and a full house. It has been suggested that it would be well for spectators at the races to-morrow to exercise caution and not venture too far out beyond the track, as the ice may not be as strong as desirable. In fact it would be well to keep considerably within the track as less danger is to be apprehended there. H. B. SMITH, Esq., recently re-appointed City Surveyor, has already commenced operations, and is preparing for permanent improvements by securing stone, ashes, &c., for spring work. The substantial and permanent manner in which, under his supervision when formerly in office, our streets, sidewalks and crossings were rebuilt, attest his skill and practical knowledge of the work under his control. Mr. Smith's re-appointment to the office of City Surveyor meets with general approval. A SHERIDAN correspondent of the St. John Telegraph says: "A few days ago a boy named Muggidge, son of James Muggidge, of Shediac, returned home from Panama, where he had been for two years at work on the canal. He left home five years ago for Manitoba, and worked there for three years. He was near death's door with the fever before leaving the isthmus. He says that, from the hospital where he was, from 20 to 30 dead bodies would be sent out every day he was there."

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) Post Office Burglarized.

TRURO, N. S., Feb. 15. The Truro Post Office was burglarized, and the safe blown open at half-past one this morning. The burglars drilled the force plate of the safe, and loaded the lock chamber with powder. The force of the concussion was sufficient to break the safe door against the wall, shattering the wooden partition, and doing other damage. The burglars secured from the safe nine registered letters, containing nearly four hundred dollars, also a package of registered letters for the eastward mail clerks, contents unknown, and a small amount of cash. They evidently understood their business, as they left behind the checks, money orders, etc., not easily negotiated.

LONDON'S Unemployed. BIRMINGHAM, Feb. 15. A meeting of unemployed workmen held here to-day, was attended by 8,000 persons. The addresses delivered were of the most inflammatory nature, and the assemblage degenerated into a mob which attempted to run riot in the streets and pillage the shops. The police, however, were prepared, and succeeded in suppressing the rioting and preventing the acts of pillage.

The Moncton Mayorality. MONCTON, Feb. 15. The Mayorality contest here promises to be warm, though not as much so as in previous years. The candidates are John McKenzie and Dennis A. Duffy, both prominent citizens, and both having had experience at the Council Board. Mayor Stevens, having served three terms, will not offer again.

Strike at an End. SPRING HILL, N. S., Feb. 15. The miners' strike practically terminated on Saturday night. A lengthy conference between the committee and management took place, after the committee's report had been submitted to the lodge. The announcement that work would be resumed on Monday morning was received with general rejoicing.

The New England Floods. BOSTON, Feb. 15. The flood in Roxbury district has subsided, but many cellars are still submerged, and much damage is anticipated by the falling of undermined buildings. The Neponset River, flowing through Dedham, Hyde Park, Mattapan and Neponset, is rising, and it is feared several dams will give way before morning.

Dilke Silent. LONDON, Feb. 15. Sir Charles Dilke has decided to preserve the policy of silence in regard to the very serious disclosures made at the recent trial. He has decided to make no explanation of his conduct to the Chelsea electors. It is certain that he will not receive a place in Mr. Gladstone's Cabinet.

Armed Employes. LEICESTER, Feb. 15. The number of strikers here has increased. The crowds are parading the streets. One firm has armed its employes with revolvers to protect its premises in case of attack by paraders.

Cabinet Meeting. LONDON, Feb. 15. The Cabinet held a meeting to-day, the session lasting four hours. John Morley, the new Chief Secretary for Ireland, was present. The principal subject under discussion was the Irish question.

Obituary. LONDON, Feb. 15. Viscount Edward Cardwell is dead. He was in his 73rd year.
