APPRECIABLE INCREASE NOTED IN LOCAL EMPLOYMENT SITUATION

The National Employment Office in Charlottetown has a slightly smaller number of benefit claims in process of payment, than it had at this date one year ago. Throughout the latter part of August and the first two weeks of Sept., employment increased appreciably, and there is a scarcity of tradesmen in some occupations, notably of bricklayers. A number of bricklayers in parts from outside the province, are employed in Charlottetown, because local men were not available.

The City Council of Charlottetown is carrying out much worthwhile work in the way of street, storm, sewer, and side-walk repairs, and improvements. The work is being done in all parts of the City, and many eyesores and problems, have been removed or remedied.

The damage to Victoria Park breastwork, estimated at several thousand dollars, is also being made good and providing considerable employment.

On the waterfront the arrival of fertilizer boats will engage members of the Labor Union in the near future, and it is expected that the potato movement by ship will commence in October. It is not known as yet how extensive the shipments will be through this port.

Yesterday the Charlottetown National Employment Office had orders on hand for twenty-one laborers, but more than half of these were for short time work only.

The demand for workers in Labrador and other northern sites has practically ceased, indicating that large-scale construction jobs in those areas are nearing completion.

Uncertain Prospects Elsewhere
The local office receives inquiries every day about the possibilities of work in other provinces. It informs all who plan to seek work on the Mainland, or in Upper Canada, that employment opportunities, are uncertain in those sections of Canada especially for men. Girl office workers seem to be able to find employment successfully in Toronto and other Ontario centres.

Compared to the rest of Canada, say local employment officials, Charlottetown and Queens and Kings Counties seem to be fairly well off from an employment viewpoint. Prince County, it is reported by the National Employment Office in that town, is not so well situated and more men are idle than last year.

Prince County however will employ many men in harvesting, grading, and shipping the potato crop, since the largest growers on the Island are residents of that part of the Province. For the first time in some years it is believed that many potato pickers will be available in Prince County, though it will still be necessary to bring many men from Cape Breton to assist in harvesting. Summarized by employment officials, the overall employment outlook in the Province is fair to good.

Deportation action had been brought against her on the ground she joined the Communist party after coming to the United States in 1937 as a permanent resident. Similar action is pending against her former husband.
