THE CAMPAIGN IN INDIA.

Forced March Down a River.

A COLD BATH FOR THE MEN.

Tired of War and Want a Respite.

LONDON, Dec. 17.—Later details have been received of the march of General Westacott's Brigade down the Bara Valley. The troops had to march into a river bed five hundred yards wide, the stream being swollen with snow. On the right was a sheer range of high hills with bushes covering reaching up to the snow level, and on the left were cliffs, and all the heights were occupied. The motley baggage train gaunt, and smoke-begrimmed stretcher bearers and ammunition ponies, and the crowds of camp followers were all mixed in an inextricable confusion, a seething, struggling mass, wading knee and waist deep, urged onward by the knowledge that a restless foe was in the rear. In the faces of all, black and white, was the look which indicates that the men have had enough of war and want a respite.

Opening of Parliament.

OTTAWA, Dec. 17.—The date of the meeting of parliament was discussed at a Cabinet Council held yesterday. It is reported that a majority of the minister favor January the 27th; but the chances are that February 3rd will be fixed on. The decision it is expected will be finally arrived at on Saturday.

Resignations Withdrawn.

OTTAWA, Dec. 17.—Letters have been received at the militia department from the officers of the 66th battalion at Halifax withdrawing their resignations.

An Unfounded Report.

OTTAWA, Nov. 17.—The report that Major Walsh lost all his supplies is unfounded.

Small Pox in Montreal.

MONTREAL, Dec. 17.—Another case of Small pox is reported.

Assassination in London.

LONDON, Dec. 17.—William Teriss, the well-known actor has been assassinated, being stabbed as he was entering the stage door of the Adelphi Theatre last night.

Heavy Weather.

DUBLIN, Dec. 17.—Terrific weather is reported in the south-west coast of Ireland.

Sudden Death.

PARIS, Dec. 17.—M. Daudet died suddenly while at dinner last night.

LIBERAL LEADERS BROUGHT TO BOOK.

Interesting Meeting at Quebec

MONTREAL, Dec. 17.—Much interest will centre in the events at Quebec for the next few days, on account of the arrival there of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Mr. Tarte, Mr. Geoffrion and Mr. Dobell.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

MONTREAL, Dec. 15.—The bills in connection with the recent outbreak of small pox in Montreal amount to about thirty thousand dollars.

OTTAWA, Dec. 15.—Pickford & Black's steamer Beta for Halifax to the West Indies is to be fitted with cold storage for the carriage of poultry, meats, butter, etc. It promises to be a market of considerable value.

BIARRITZ, France, December 15.—Mail advices from Madrid state that twenty generals have protested to the minister of war against President McKimley's message to Congress which is considered insulting to the Spanish army.

SIMLA, Dec. 15.—Further details from the frontier regarding the march of Gen. Westacott's brigade down the Bara Valley shows it to have been accompanied by the most desperate fighting since the storming of Dargai Ridge. The British troops behaved splendidly and inflicted the most severe punishment on the enemy which the latter has yet sustained, 400 men falling on the field.

OTTAWA, Dec. 15.—There is talk here which cannot be traced to any official source that parliament will be asked to endorse proposals from the post office department reducing letter postage to two cents throughout the whole Dominion of Canada. The reduction will be conditional on parliament's consent to the abolition of free transmission for newspapers.

WELLINGTON, N. Y., December 14.—The house of representatives today passed a resolution submitted by the premier, the Hon. Richard J. Seddon, in favor of establishing a fortnightly mail service between Wellington and San Francisco and Wellington and Vancouver, B. C. It is understood that the proposal referred to in the foregoing dispatch is to subsidize an alternate fortnightly mail service between the points named, passage from Wellington to Vancouver not to exceed 21 days.

HAVANA, Dec. 15.—Gen Marotto, it is announced from the palace, has been engaged with an insurgent force at the farm of La-tra. Three insurgents were killed. Later the official announcement continues that the general's forces surprised the camp occupied by the insurgent leaders Collazo and Aca, at the farm of Paz. The insurgents, according to the official report, left 43 men killed on the field. The troops captured 34 fire arms and some documents and the column had a captain and one private killed.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Dec. 15.—The Rev. Virgil Moulton, pastor of the Weeping Willows Baptist Church, before the collection was taken last night denounced the Board of Deacons, alleging that the contributions Sunday after Sunday had been diverted to the private needs of the deacons who passed the boxes. Last Sunday night when the money was counted by the pastor the amount was less than on any previous Sunday, though the congregation was large, and he so declared. Jefferson Boyd, one of the deacons, jumped from his pew and before he could be prevented stabbed the preacher in the side twice. Boyd escaped through a side door, but was arrested later. The preacher's condition is critical.

LONDON, Dec. 15.—Military circles are praising Sir William Lochart's conduct in the campaign in India. The exciting events that have happened in other quarters of the world during the last 30 days have diverted attention from the attempt to punish Afridia. But the undertaking, in its way, is the most remarkable in which England has ever been engaged. Gen. Lochart has under his personal command a larger body of troops than was ever before commanded by a British general. He has 70,000 men in the field, more than Wellington had at Waterloo, where only 25,000 were actually British. In the exceptionally difficult conditions, the mountainous and unknown country, the cold season, the labour of maintaining communication along a very extended line, and the fierce fanaticism of tribes that believe they are fighting for a righteous cause, and for very existence, Sir William Lochart has displayed remarkable ingenuity and resources.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 16.—Senator Perkins, of California, and Ira Wilson, have had a consultation with Secretary Gage in which they recommended that the sub port of entry of Dyea be abolished. They presented numerous papers and petitions to this effect, which represented that Dyea as a sub port now furnishes advantages to persons from British Columbia, which are not given to United States citizens going through the passes and to the Klondike country. British subjects now ship goods to Dyea in bond and they are passed on to the Northwest Territory unhampered by customs of any kind. United States citizens, the petitions say, meet annoyances as soon as they reach the lakes in British northwest Territory. Secretary Gage said he would investigate the matter and would also ask the commerce committee of the Senate to make a thorough inquiry.
