### Blood Donor Clinics Opening Today At SDU

Students at St. Dunstan's University will start their work for this week's Red Cross blood donor clinics which will be the first to be held in the province's "Centennial Year."

Winston Cannon of Summerside, a senior student, is the chairman of the Red Cross blood donor committee for the Students' Council at St. Dunstan's and said last night that every thing is in readiness for this afternoon clinic which has an objective of at least 225 donors for the three hour period. Mr. Cannon stated that some 20 students have volunteered to assist with the various duties to be carried out in connection with the clinic, and that he is confident that the overall objective will be exceeded.

"Competition among the different centres at St. Dunstan's is always keen" said Mr. Cannon, "and since it is rumoured that there is a new and very attractive trophy up for inter-collegiate competition, each of the classes is determined to lay claim to it. For the past number of years St. Dunstan's has been 'away out front' in the competition for 'Blood donor supremacy' against Prince of Wales college, but at last year's clinic, Prince of Wales had a slight margin over the 'Saints' for the first time as 225 registered from PWC to 'top' the 234 from StDU."

Gilbert Gaudet of Charlottetown, newly appointed blood donor chairman at PWC is making every effort to have PWC as the "first" winner of the "Centennial Trophy" now on display in the Maritime Electric Co. window which is up for special competition between the two colleges in 1964. "As of this afternoon" Mr. Gaudet said, "the battle will be on between the two colleges with the 'Saints' leading by a margin of about 200 students from each college involved."

The clinics in Charlottetown will get underway at 7:30 a.m. on Thursday and Friday with an expected total of at least 1,065 donors in the three days.

### Prof. Civil Servants Get Pay Boost Today
