Chevrier Challenges Harkness Statement

OTTAWA (CP) — Lionel Chevrier hotly denied a "totally inaccurate" Wednesday Commons statement by Agriculture Minister Harkness that a man who had been an election campaign organizer for Mr. Chevrier was fired by the agriculture department after he was found in possession of contraband liquor and American cigarettes.

Mr. Chevrier, former Liberal transport minister and now MP for Montreal Laurier, said he would deal with the minister's statements later during debate on agriculture department estimates. Mr. Harkness, however, said his statement was accurate. "I guarantee that they are accurate statements," he said in reply to Mr. Chevrier. He said Mr. Chevrier should be more careful in his claims.

Speaker Roland Michener cut off further discussion.

Mr. Harkness made his statement in reply to a written question by Mr. Chevrier about the dismissal of Walter Mitchell of Montreal, an agriculture department employee at the port there. The minister said Mr. Mitchell was dismissed last month.

Mr. Harkness said he received "complaints" that Mr. Mitchell had been an "active political organizer" for Mr. Chevrier in the last two elections and later received information that Last Nov. 29 Mr. Mitchell was found in possession of contraband liquor and contraband American cigarettes.

The minister said on Mr. Mitchell's own admission he had obtained the goods from ships in the port while carrying out his duties as checker.

The department could not countenance that conduct, Mr. Harkness said, and had ordered Mr. Mitchell's dismissal.
