Assault Courses Discontinued As Army Punishment

OTTAWA, (CP)—Army personnel in detention barracks no longer will be ordered to engage in different assault courses as a form of punishment.

The defence department said Monday that the practice has been discontinued as a result of the death last summer of Pte. Frederick Joseph Burke, 29, of Regina, at Petawawa military camp, 120 miles northwest of Ottawa.

Djilas Excluded From All Gov't Jobs In Yugoslavia

BELGRADE, (Reuters)—A humble future as a private citizen looms for Yugoslav vice-president Milovan Djilas, Communist leader who has fallen from favor after straying from the party line.

It was announced Monday that he has resigned as president of the Yugoslav parliament—a post he was given only three weeks ago.

The central committee of the Yugoslav Communist party Sunday "excluded" him from holding office in the party, including a position on the 108-man executive committee.

He is expected to be removed from his post as one of the country's four vice-presidents when parliament reconvenes Jan. 27.

But Djilas is not expected to be purged or arrested for his "heresy," President Tito, at the meeting of the party's central committee which expelled Djilas from his party posts, said the days have gone when the Yugoslav Communist party liquidated members who diverged from the party line.

The committee retained Djilas an ordinary party member. But, angered by newspaper and magazine articles he wrote which attacked party leaders' privileges and urged a more "democratic" party line, he gave him a "final warning."

It was disclosed Monday that Djilas resigned his presidency of parliament several days before the central committee met.

Drifting Snow Blocks Many Roads In Prince

—Snow plows were busy yesterday in sub-zero temperatures, opening main highways throughout the county.

In many sections, however, a steady ground drift blocked the road again after the plow had passed.

Highway officials said last evening that the snow drifts blocked the road, and the Borden-Bonshaw-Charlottetown road had been opened during the day.

The road from Summerside to Kensington and from Hunter River to Charlottetown was re-opened open last evening, but information available suggested that the section between Kensington and Hunter River was probably closed by ground drift.

West of Summerside the highway was open to Day's Corner, and ground drift from that point on was expected to cause trouble for motorists last evening.

Begins 16th Consecutive Year As Granby's Mayor

GRANBY, Que. (CP)—Canada's "Mr. Mayor," dynamic P. Horace Boivin, Monday began his 16th consecutive year as chief magistrate of this bustling eastern township city 50 miles east of Montreal.

The colorful 48-year-old industrialist was alone in the field when mayoralty nominations closed at noon Monday. He was declared re-elected by acclamation for his seventh term.

No one was surprised. The mayoralty seat has been held by the Boivin family as long as many of the city's 30,000 residents can remember. The mayor's father—the late P. E. Boivin—served as mayor for 17 consecutive years.

The son took over in 1939, and it appears a safe bet he will break his father's record.

Mr. Boivin is also president of the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities and the Quebec Union of Municipalities. He is the only Quebecer to have headed both groups.

When the National Film Board decided to make a movie short of a typical Canadian mayor, Mr. Boivin was picked as the star.

With almost boundless energy the bilingual mayor spends weeks and months traveling in Canada and abroad in efforts to persuade industries to locate in Granby.

The city now has approximately 100 small industries producing such things as plastics, electronic, aluminum castings and textiles.
