130 Teachers Resign At Edmundston

EDMUNDSTON, N.B. (CP)—An official of the local branch of the New Brunswick Teachers Association said Sunday all except two of this city's 132 teachers have resigned effective June 30 and are "just waiting" for the school board's next move.

Friday night 101 teachers resigned en masse after contract negotiations between the school trustees and the association broke down. Earlier 29 teachers had resigned for the same reason. The association says the resignations were submitted because otherwise the present contract would have been automatically renewed.

The board accepted the resignations terming them "illegal, unjustified and premature." Board chairman H. T. Lajoie called the teachers' wage demands excessive.

Meanwhile the NBTA an-

nounced it would consider it unethical for any licensed teachers to apply for positions here until the dispute is settled. The trustees countered that they would consider it unethical for other school boards to hire any of the teachers who resigned.

Four elementary schools and two high schools, all bilingual, are involved. Some classes are taught in French, others in English. All are public schools. There are no parochial schools here though some Roman Catholic sisters are employed as teachers.

Basic salaries set by the provincial government range from \$1,600 to \$3,200 a year. Trustees say actual salaries range from \$2,055 to \$5,420. They say raises up to \$1,350 a year per teacher were offered during negotiations. The board said its final offer would have cost the city \$48,000 a year.

A. H. Kingett, secretary-treasurer of the NBTA said Saturday the board's final offer was below minimum standards in seven specific instances. He said "fairly large" increases were offered to married male teachers, a smaller boost to unmarried females and none for married women and nuns.

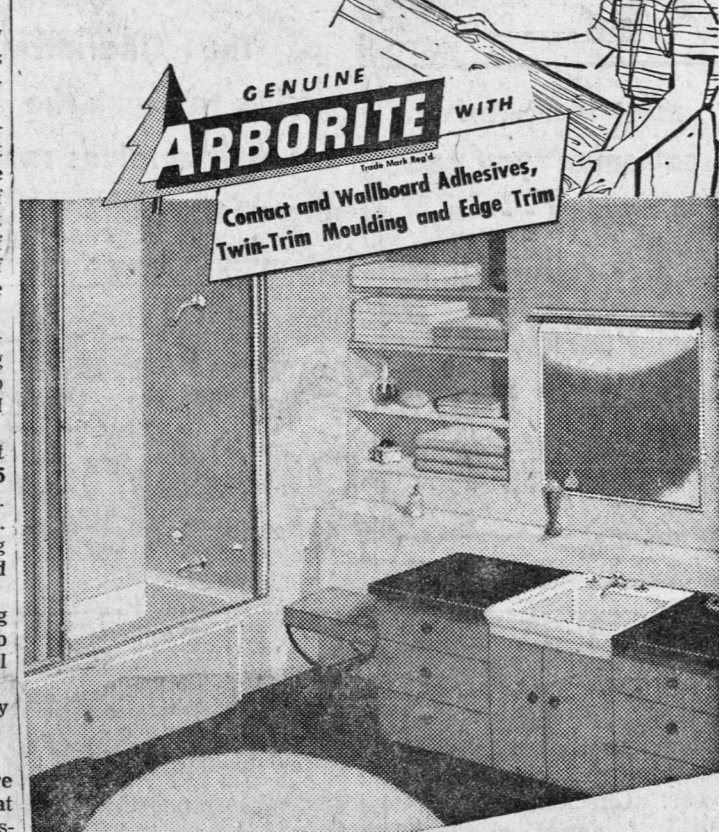
GIRL GUIDES
