This year the Irish farmers are sending cargoes of potatoes to Great Britain. Moreover, a considerable quantity of Irish potatoes is being shipped from Glasgow to the United States.

But we should like to see them assisted by good stout steam launches. They deserve all the assistance that can be given by the public; and it is a shame that they do not receive it. Prices as follows: Beef (small) per lb. 5 to 12 cents; do, (quarter) 34 to 7 cents; Mutton per lb 4 to 8 cents; Lamb per lb 4 to 8 cents; Veal per lb 3 to 7 cents; Ducks each, 20 to 30 cents; Fowls each 15 to 20 cents; Butter (fresh) per pair 25 to 45 cents; Butter (fresh) 20 to 24 cents; Day per cwt 35 to 45 cents; Potatoes per bush 35 to 40 cents; Flour per cwt \$3.25 to \$3.50; Oatmeal per cwt \$3.00 to \$3.25; Oat per bush, 32 to 35 cents; Geese each, 40 to 60 cents; Sheepskins, 60 to 80 cents; Pork per carcass, 55 to 75 cents; do, small 8 to 11 cents; Turkeys each 50 to 90 cents; Turnips, 20 to 22 cents per bushel.

THE Toronto Mail says: "Shippers are commencing to understand that it is to their own advantage to receive their freight via the Intercolonial and Grand Trunk rather than by way of Boston. The route is establishing a name for dispatch which will be benefited by the record of the freight arriving per steamer Plymeston on Friday last. She was docked in Halifax at 12.45 a. m. and 913 tons unloaded for Western Canada the same day. Leaving about five o'clock, the first consignment reached Point Levi in 40 hours, and was on to Ontario at five o'clock on the 6th, or in 96 hours. Only 160 tons of Canada freight was sent via Boston, and this is yet to be heard from, as the express goods only reached here yesterday.

THE CHAIRMAN of the BOGUS SYNDICATE in TROUBLE.—The Ontario Bank, of which Sir William Howland is the President, is at present, not in that prosperous and satisfactory condition which many persons would desire. A meeting of Shareholders and Directors was recently held, at which some pretty plain talk was indulged in. Mr. Glass, in reply to some remarks from the President, said that "Sir William Howland had made an unwarranted assertion. He (Mr. Glass) thought such language did not become the man who had robbed him (confusion) be carved not for the plumes of cheap and false (great confusion) but would assert himself. Here one of those present rose to resent Mr. Glass's language towards Sir William. Another gentleman asked what right had Mr. Glass there? Mr. Glass said "that he represented 400 stockholders in the English Loan Company, an institution which had been ruined by the Ontario Bank." Sir William Howland, it will be remembered, stood first on the bogus Syndicate, or the Blake Syndicate, as the style writer of the Souris intercepted letter has it. We simply leave our readers to draw their own conclusions.
