Potato Marketing Outlook Reviewed

The Guardian is indebted to Associated Shippers Incorporated for the following information on the potato situation. The U. S. crop report issued Monday gave a small decrease in Maine, and increased all the rest of the Eastern States to a total of 103,852,000 bushels. This is up two million from the September estimate but down eight million from last year.

This increase has disappointed many potato growers who had hoped for a decided decrease. It would appear that given average shrinkage in storage there are plenty of potatoes in the United States to supply the winter and spring demands. The movement of potatoes from P.E.I. has been about normal for the period up to October 12th when 280 carloads were ferried, against 281 in 1953.

The demand for P.E.I. potatoes from Montreal and Ontario is good and the prices slightly stronger. Present market, from \$1.10 to \$1.15 for seventy-five pounds bulk at the shipping point.

Montreal is still importing potatoes from Long Island — where the market is from \$1.25 to \$1.35 for one hundred pounds bulk to the grower. This is very unusual and shows that a strong demand for Maritime potatoes will develop as the season advances.

The market in Maine is unchanged. Buying price for storage stocks \$2.00 per barrel with shipments very light and practically no demand. There is some inquiry for P.E.I. seed potatoes for fall movement, but as yet the buyers of large quantities are not active in the market here. The October U.S. estimate should clear the situation to the extent that the seed buyer will begin to look for his requirements.

Bloody End To Gangland Ride

NEW YORK (AP)—A gangland-style ride Wednesday night in Little Neck, on Long Island, ended with one man slain, another wounded, a third man held and the self-described intended victim alive to tell the story. The bloody scene, in a field, was discovered by a nearby resident who heard gunfire. Fearing his own son and two other children might be in danger, he rammed the "kidnap" car with his own auto to prevent a getaway while his wife called police.

Police said they found Dominick Sorrese dead of a bullet wound in the head; Rosario Marceca wounded in the chest with a slug from his own revolver; Andrea Bommarito, the driver, with a gun in his hand; and Anthony Governante with a rope around his neck. Authorities said Bommarito refused to talk but that Governante gave this story:

FROM SAME VILLAGE Governante, Marceca and Sorrese were natives of the same Sicilian village. Governante bought a farm in Sicily that Marceca had hoped to buy. Heated arguments followed. But Wednesday night all seemed friendly as the other three invited Governante to drive with them to see a mutual friend in Little Neck. Suddenly Bommarito swung the car into a field and Marceca, in the back seat, crashed a length of pipe on Governante's head. Then Sorrese trapped a length of rope around Governante's neck and began to tighten it.

Governante shouted for help and fought hard. Marceca drew a gun and fired. Governante swung at the weapon and deflected it so that the bullet landed in Sorrese's brain. Marceca pointed the weapon again, but Governante claimed to have bent Marceca's hand around so that Marceca shot himself in the chest. Joseph Benenati, 33, heard the shots, jumped in his car and rammed Bommarito's car. He captured Bommarito with a flying tackle.

Montreal Police Chief Back As Suspension Sought

MONTREAL (CP) — J. Albert Langlois, wearing his chief of police uniform and campaign ribbons of two world wars, Thursday returned to his office while the administration went ahead with plans to seek his suspension. He entered his office at police headquarters after reiterating to newspapermen his belief that he has the right to hold post until the courts dispose of his appeal against dismissal for tolerating vice.

Mr. Langlois was one of 20 members and former members of the police force convicted of tolerating prostitution, betting and gambling in Montreal between 1941 and 1950. The convictions followed a 3 1/2 year inquiry into vice conditions by Mr. Justice Francois Caron of the Quebec Superior Court. The police director is the only one of the 20 to file an appeal so far. Another police officer Thursday became the first to pay the penalty imposed on him by the Caron judgment. Capt. Arthur Herbert ordered to pay \$300 toward cost of the inquiry, paid the amount in Superior Court.

ORDERED DISMISSED

Mr. Langlois was ordered dismissed, banned from municipal office for one year and fined \$500 of the cost of the inquiry. Through counsel Thursday he deposited a \$1,000 bond as guarantee that he will go through with his appeal. He resumed his duties and spent a busy day after rejecting an ultimatum of the seven-man executive committee that he either resign or take a leave of absence pending his appeal.

When he declined to comply with the request, the executive committee summoned a special meeting of the city council for Monday and announced that Mr. Langlois' suspension will be sought. City hall sources have said that

Three Killed In Car-Bus Crash

WOODBRIDGE, Ont. (CP)—Police said Thursday they believe a driver, gunning his car away from a stoplight, indirectly caused the deaths of three persons in a bus-crash Thursday night.

Clifford Smith, 44, minister of United Brethren non-denominational church at Shelburne, Ont., his son Paul, 9, and Mrs. Smith's sister, Mrs. John Aitken, died in the head-on collision. Police said they believe the car was trapped on the wrong side of the road by a motorist who roared away from a stoplight at the junction of two highways. Smith was unable to return to his own lane and rammed the bus. Mrs. Smith was seriously injured in the crash. Hospital authorities said she suffered a skull fracture and broken arms and legs. Doctors fought to save her. Five bus passengers were slightly injured.

Russia Said Ready To Back Canadian Plan To Resume Disarmament Talks

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (CP)—Russia was reported ready Thursday to join Britain, the United States and France in co-sponsoring a Canadian resolution to resume five-power talks on world disarmament.

The Soviet action will follow agreement among the other four powers on several comparatively minor Russian amendments to the Canadian resolution, presented to the assembly's political committee Wednesday by Health Minister Martin.

The Canadian proposal asks that the five powers meet again privately for disarmament talks. The five met last summer in London as a sub-committee of the UN disarmament commission and evolved an Anglo-French disarmament plan upon which Russia has since based her proposal for a world disarmament treaty.

The disarmament debate now going on in the political committee is concerned mainly with this Russian proposal. While a gap exists between Western and Soviet points of view, Russia's apparent desire to solve the problem prompted the Canadian action.

Nine In Running In Montreal's Mayoralty Contest

MONTREAL (CP) — Nine candidates were in the running Thursday for Montreal's mayoralty when nominations for the Oct. 25 civic elections closed. In addition, about 180 candidates had filed nomination for the 66 council seats to be contested.

The nine candidates seeking the post held by Mayor Camilleien Houde, who has withdrawn from municipal politics because of ill health, are:

Former mayor Adhemar Raynault, former councillor Charles Lafontaine, Jean Drapeau, Montreal lawyer, co-prosecutor in the Montreal vice inquiry; Senator Sario Fournier, runner-up to Mayor Houde in 1950; Hector Dupuis, Liberal member of Parliament for Montreal St. Mary and former alderman; Camille Dionne, a carpenter; Jacques Sauriol, newspaper man, and Charles Omer Bousquet, retired industrialist.

The nine nominations are only short of the record 19 in 1940, although in that year one candidate withdrew a week after nomination.

The number of candidates for city council was believed a record. The previous high was 123 in 1950.
