The bright, sunny days this past week have brought new covets of Huns to light. February has been on her good behaviour lately and given us days of dazzling brilliance. I have covered a lot of territory recently and talked to numerous farmers and the information gathered has been heartening in the extreme. A number of farmers have remarked on the covets that showed up this past week that they had no previous knowledge had ever existed. In a certain section, there is no point in advertising it unduly, there are over 100 Huns within a mile radius of a farmer sportsman's home.

I have been asked the question four or five times just where the covets went during the sleet and ice period. The only answer I could give, and it could account for a number of covets, is that the birds hung out in some back country alder swamp where steaming springs kept plenty of fine grass available. In some swamps one may find grassy, juicy tracts that remain open during the hardest winter. Some years ago during a very tough January period section men would often flush a covey or 18 or 20 Huns along the railway track.

Scotland 1.594, who was the leading living sire of two-minute performers with 17, died February 9 at the age of 31 at Walnut Hall Farm, Lexington, Ky. At the time of his death he was owned jointly by Walnut Hall Farm and Walnut Hall Stud. Scotland was sired by Peter Scott 2.05, dam R o y a McKinney 4. 2.07. His fastest performer was the world's champion trotting mare Rosalind 1.5674, his next fastest was the world's champion trotting stallion Spencer Scott 4. 1.574. He ties with Greyhound as the fastest 4-year-old regardless of sex. Both Walnut Hall Farm and Walnut Hall Stud have a brood mare due to foal to Scotland's cover this season. In addition each farm has several yearlings that will be offered for sale this fall.

disappointment but he was generally a contender in top events. He did not race at four but was brought along carefully as a 5-year-old when Ben White raced him a couple of times for conditioning purposes, winning a handicap trot and taking a heat and two seconds in another handicap.

His first time trial was at Goshen where he stepped the mile in 2.024. A couple of weeks later he turned for the word at Syracuse and trotted a perfectly rated mile in 1.594. The following year he was placed in service at Henry Oliver's Poplar Hill Farm, Lexington. From his first crop took 2-year-olds in 1932 three took 2-year-old records in 1934. One of them was U. Scott 2.11 1/2, that was exported to New Zealand and has sired the fastest harness horse there, Highland Fling p. 1.57 4.5. The fastest of his crop in the United States was Guy Scotland 2.02. Rosalind 1.564 came from his second crop. She won in 2.03 at two, won nearly all her 3-year-old stakes races and in her 4-year-old form set up a world's record of 1.594 in the Transylvania Stake. Next season at five she went in 1.564, which is the world's record for trotting mares.

It would take pages to give credit to Scotland for his progeny since then but every year his get have been commanding tremendous prices at Walnut Hall Farm or Walnut Hall Stud sales. His top money winning trotting son is Scotch Victor 2.00, owned by Sol Camp, and now in stud service at Hanover Shoe Farms. Another 2.00 son is Hoot Mon, also at the same farm, whose get are bringing sensational prices, one of them, Scott Frost, being leading 2 and 3-year-old trotter for the past two years. The daughters of Scotland are also considered among the best by the judges of breeding. One of his fastest sons, Spencer Scott 4. 1.574, who would probably have been the greatest sire of today had he lived, passed away at an early age. Another Rodney 1.57 2-5, is showing prospects of being a worthy son of a worthy sire. There are no question but that Scotland will be one of the immortals among harness horses and that he will be placed in a prominent niche in the Hall of Fame at Goshen. Among the sons of Scotland owned in the Maritime is the trotter Scotland's Ace 2.09, owned by Andrew Perry of Summerside, Headway 3. 2.06 3-5, owned by Jimmie Given of Halifax, and Scottish Boy 2.01 3-5, owned by J. Hatty, Saint John, N. B. The popular sire Playde 4. 2.04 1/2, owned by the late Willard Kelly, was also by Scotland. In the sires and dams book he is credited with six trotters and nine pacers.

Training news from the south continues good and the statement that this year's crop of 2-year-olds appears the best in years will, we believe, be amply verified by their doings at the races. 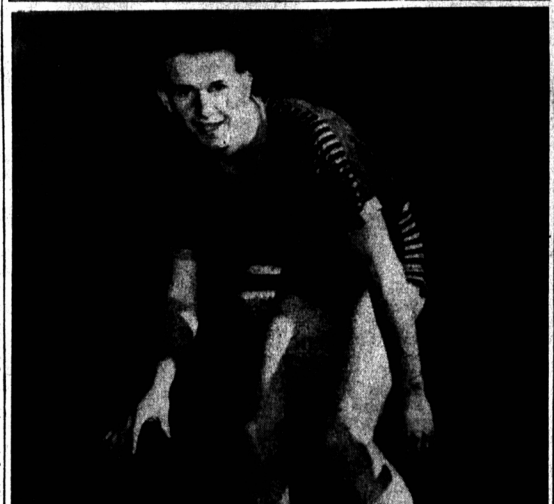
