

British Aircraft Industry Limps On 2 Hopes, Prayer

By DOUG MARSHALL. LONDON (CP) — Britain's civil aviation industry is limping along on two hopes and a prayer. The two hopes are the Vickers VC-10, a long-range passenger aircraft that is Britain's answer to advanced models of the Boeing 707, and the Anglo-French 1500-mile-a-hour Concorde jetliner. The prayer is the British government, under heavy pressure from the publicly owned British Overseas Airlines Corporation, will not cancel the £200,000,000 order for 30 super VC-10s already placed by BOAC. Both aircraft have given the government many headaches since they first appeared on the drawing board. The reason in both cases, broadly speaking, is a question in many minds whether British aircraft can continue to compete economically with United States planes. Plots For Castro's Overtrow

By BEN MEYER. MIAMI (AP) — The Bay of Pigs is well into its fourth year of history and still 100,000 hostile Cubans stare at the sea, some ailing, some plotting to overthrow Fidel Castro. The money for this endeavor pours in from many sources around the world. For the Bay of Pigs operation the major source of funds as well as the management, equipment and training of the invader forces has been charged to the U.S. government Central Intelligence Agency. Reports are that the CIA is a contributor of money and technical advice, but on a much more modest scale than the Bay of Pigs. A popularly used figure on the cost of this operation was \$40,000,000.

In addition to the three major action groups, five or six dozen other organizations have announced they will do what they can to help free Cuba. Some plan small raids on their own; others engage in propaganda activities, psychological warfare through pamphlets, letters and radio broadcasts (Miami has three commercial Spanish language radio stations); some keep tabs on economic, fiscal, educational, military, health, prison and other problems of the Castro regime. All except that sooner or later they will get massive support from Cuba within Cuba, from the U.S., or from Latin American nations — or a combination of all three. Ernesto Freyre, respected leader of a five-man war board chosen in a referendum of 40,000 exiles, says "big luck but we can and must overcome it." Yet differences among exiles are so deep that many are skeptical.

U.S. officials deny reports of currency groups. A study of some of the many refugee groups tells the story of the beatitudes of about 250,000 Cuban exiles in the U.S., of the enormous task the "action" groups face in ousting the U.S.-estimated Communist police state system and of the weaknesses of their organizations. There has been criticism that some of the groups are fighting a publicity war against Castro while jockeying for leadership of the refugees.

GUERRILLA ACTIVITIES. Manuel A. Varona, former premier of Cuba, recently announced dissolution of the Cuban Revolutionary Council, a U.S.-proclaimed sponsor of the Bay of Pigs invasion. It had been formed in 1961. The United States had committed itself to a new invasion of Cuba. The late president John F. Kennedy denied it. U.S. aid to the council was \$1 million a year when it was cut off in April 1963. Exiles thought they noted a hint from Washington that raids from other countries would be tolerated. A state department declaration June 1 said "attacks which may take place from other countries are, of course, beyond the scope of our control."

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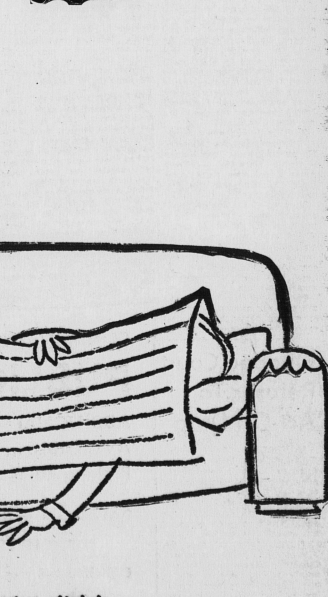

U.S. government agencies are active in Miami. The department of health, education and welfare operates the Cuban refugee centre which has registered 172,177 Cuban refugees since January 1961, and has resettled 77,898 throughout the U.S. Its current appropriation is \$70,000,000 and in preceding years it spent \$99,000,000. It helps 40,000 Cubans in the Miami area with monthly payments of \$60 to single persons and \$100 to families.

MORTAR ATTACK. KUALA LUMPUR (AP) — A Malaysian source said Malaysian troops and Indonesian guerrillas clashed in Sarawak, Thursday. Reports said the Indonesians used mortars during a fight in the Malaysian Borneo state. There were no immediate reports of casualties.
