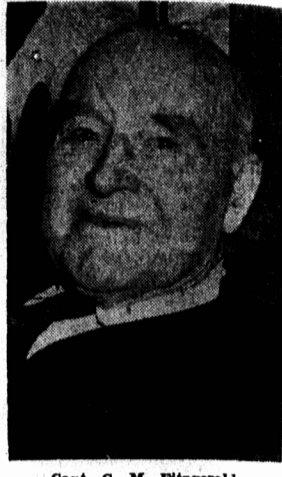

Georgetown Sea Captain Has Interesting Career

Captain C. M. Fitzgerald, known to young and old alike in Georgetown as Capt. Charlie, was born in St. Peter's Cape Breton in 1864. Now retired and in his 88th year is never happier than when he is discussing the sea and ships.

At the age of nineteen he made his first voyage aboard a fishing schooner bound for the Grand Banks. In the autumn of 1884 he sailed from Souris, P. E. I., bound for Providence, R. I., as a crew member of the new vessel, "General Gordon" owned by Mathew and McLellan of Souris.

In a howling north east gale and snow storm off the Nova Scotia coast the vessel was dismasted but the crew were rescued by another ship and landed at Halifax, from where they were transported to their homes in Prince Edward Island by way of Picotou, making the crossing to Georgetown on the famous ice-breaker, "Northern Light". The "General Gordon" was a total loss and her hull drifted ashore on Goose Island, off Isaac's Harbour, N. S.

Wide Experience For many years the captain sailed in brigantines, topsail schooners, and fore-and-aft schooners, plying the West Indies trade from Halifax. For a time he was employed at shipbuilding with the Four Rivers Shipbuilding Corporation in Quincy, Mass., apprenticing in a profession he later practised in his own shipyard in Georgetown.

In 1917, during the first World War, he was a member of the Canadian crew, under command of the late Captain John Read of Bordet, who took an ice-breaker built at Canadian Vickers in Montreal and sold to the Ozeanist government - to Russia. The ship, christened the "J. D. Haden", but re-christened a Russian name at an elaborate ceremony in Quebec prior to sailing, was reputed to be the most powerful ice-breaker afloat at the time. The ship was delivered to Russia at the Port of Archangel.

After spending a month at Petrograd, the crew left for their homes in Canada by rail across northern Russia, over the Ural Mountains to Manchuria, across the Gobi Desert to Vladivostok. It was while Captain Fitzgerald was in Vladivostok that the Russian Revolution broke out. The Russian home was continued to Tsuguru in Japan, thence to Yokohama, from where passage was taken for Vancouver, B. C., on the C. P. R. ship "Empress of Russia".

From Vancouver the party journeyed by rail to Montreal. Captain Fitzgerald then worked for a time with the Standard Shipbuilding Corporation in New York. Shortly after the First World War he returned to Georgetown, where he opened his own ship-yard.

Built Fast Schooner At his own yard he built the schooner, "Charlotte M." and sailed her as master, in coastal trade. To this day there is many a seafaring man who will claim that the Georgetown built "Charlotte M." could outlast the famous Blue-nose and racing schooner Bluenose. At his Georgetown ship yard, Capt. Charlie built the ferries, "Newport", "Montague II" and "Fairview" for the Provincial government.

Some years ago he dismantled his shipyard and retired from the life of the sea. Since then he has served as Town Clerk for the Town of Georgetown for three terms, in all over six years. The Captain retired from this position in August, 1922.

Captain Fitzgerald's wife, the former Catherine Robertson of Montague, passed away some years ago. He has three sons, Jack, in California, William, who is Postmaster at Georgetown, and one daughter, Lottie, died a few years ago in Western Canada and another daughter, Mae, is a member of the Religious Order, Sisters of Service in Manitoba.

Captain C. M. Fitzgerald's many friends throughout the Province wish this grand old gentleman many more years of enjoyable retirement. —AC
