

Communist Viet Cong Strikes Back At Tanks

SAIGON (AP)—Striking troops of the Communist Viet Cong killed four American military men Tuesday in a swift sequel to the U.S. government's decision to increase its military commitments in South Viet Nam.

Meanwhile, South Vietnamese pressure persisted for expansion of the war to Communist North Viet Nam as a major Washington considers at least weekly.

Gen. Nguyen Khanh, the strongman premier, blamed his regime would feel free to strike on its own if it decided to stage what he called such a "counter-attack, a defensive action" to support.

Saigon university students called for a march on the north in a riotous anti-French demonstration, their second in eight days. Police gave way and watched politely as a screaming band pulled down and dragged away a huge bronze monument to France's war dead.

The loss of the four Americans increased to 163 the number of U.S. combat dead and to 390 the number of U.S. deaths from all causes in South Viet Nam since the United States began a massive buildup of its support and advisory forces in December, 1961.

Two U.S. Army officers and an air force man were blamed for the deaths by an electric mine detonated under their jeep as they drove in a convoy of military vehicles 21 miles south of Saigon.

Summit Meet Is Decision

BONN (Reuters)—West Germany announced Tuesday that Chancellor Erhard and Soviet Premier Khrushchev have declared their readiness to stage a Russo-West German summit meeting.

Chief West German government spokesman Guenther Von Hase told a press conference that visiting Afghan Ambassador Khrushchev's son-in-law, informed Erhard at a meeting Tuesday morning Khrushchev considers an exchange of views between the two heads of state would be useful.

"German readiness to talk with the Soviet premier is based upon an unlimited range of subjects was confirmed," Von Hase said.

However, observers said, one in Bonn believes a Khrushchev-Erhard summit is likely to produce major advances on the German question.

von Hase made it clear no formal invitation to Bonn has been issued by Erhard and the next move was up to the Kremlin.

Russia May Buy Canadian Wheat

Hinman's resignation was announced by the premier at a hastily-called press conference and a morning meeting between Mr. Hinman and Mr. Manning.

The premier told the press conference the action was taken because Mr. Hinman, in a private capacity, was associated with the promotion and operation of a dubious company enterprises not associated with government.

The premier declined to elaborate on the minister's private activities.

"In my opinion, it is not possible to divorce the influence and prestige of a cabinet post from private business activities of this nature," Mr. Manning said.

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Indian Queen Changes Title

OTTAWA (CP)—Mohawk model Kahn-Tiela Horn has changed her title from Indian princess to Miss Indian Canada to avoid any quarrel at the National Indian Council meeting starting today at Gatineau, Que.

Miss Horn, here in connection with an August fashion show, told reporters:

"While I see it as an allegation against me are completely false and the recent study of the constitution of the council makes it clear that my discharge was illegal, it is my intention to avoid any quarrel or discussion at the coming meet of the council in order to protect the interests of the council."

STRIPPED OF TITLE

Miss Horn recently had her title of Indian princess taken away by members of the council. She said she has resumed her modeling career in other fashion projects.

She will attend the Garden City meeting "the most important in the history of Indians in Canada" and will come to formal treaties with the crown, and said she would propose a welfare fund to council that would go far beyond the federal government's new three-year plan community development program.

"The title of princess and welfare fund must be built on a program of 35 years with an objective of a self-sufficient supporting a 2 d economically equal to others in Canada by 1969."

She also said she would ask the Indian council to adopt a new constitution that would include an assembly of Canada's 2,037 band chiefs, which would meet "from time to time."
