Cleveland Barons Crush Rochester

CLEVELAND (AP)—Cleveland Barons, paced by Johnny McLellan's three goals, crushed Rochester Americans 5-1 Saturday night to take a 2-1 lead in the best-of-seven Calder Cup final series before a crowd of 10,753.

The game was one of the roughest of the season, with a total of 21 penalties called, 19 in the first two periods.

McLellan opened the scoring at the 12:19 mark of the second period while both teams were at full strength. Joe Lund, a former Cleveland player, tied the score three

minutes later while Ken Shvets of Cleveland was sitting out a two-minute penalty.

Fred Glover made it 2-1 for Cleveland at the 19:01 mark.

McLellan scored twice in the third period. His second goal came two seconds after Rochester forward Paul Masnick returned to the ice from a minor penalty. Dan Polizani completed the scoring at 18:45.

Baseball Opener Between Washington And Baltimore

WASHINGTON (AP) — Baltimore and Washington, a pair of 100-to-1 shots, get the jump on the rest of the major league clubs Monday with a special opening day at Griffith Stadium where President Eisenhower will throw out the first ball.

The annual business of sifting New York Yankees' opponents in the world series starts in earnest Tuesday with a full schedule of eight games in the two leagues.

Old familiar faces like Bob Feller and Al Rosen are gone, others like Del Ennis, Virgil Trucks and Warren Hacker are wearing new uniforms and three new managers grace the scene. Jack Tighe has taken over at Detroit, Kerby Farrell at Cleveland and Bob Scheffing with Chicago Cubs. Al Lopez, hardly a rookie manager, has moved from Cleveland to Chicago White Sox.

With Mickey Mantle and Yogi Berra in good health and a talent-stacked roster, the Yankees are expected to cakewalk in the American, perhaps easier than last year. There are dissenters, of course, notably the managers of the contenders, but the odds-makers in Las Vegas have made Casey Stengel's perennial champions a 2-to-5 favorite.

All observers expect another tight race in the National League which went down to the final day last fall before Brooklyn finally nosed out Milwaukee.

The Dodgers and Braves, co-favorites, probably will fight it out again with Cincinnati also challenging. A long distance threat from St. Louis, if Freddie Hutchinson comes up with some solid pitching, just about sums up the National. Pittsburgh can be pesky and the Phillies tough.
