NEWSY NOTES

was used as a spray, dust and as seed treatment in connection with the spotted alfalfa aphid, and gave effective control of that new pest. Thimet sprays and dust on both alfalfa and clover crops proved effective against mites, aphids, scales and other pests.

In transplanting cabbage and tobacco plants, those that were dipped in thimet water solutions were free from aphids for weeks longer than those not treated. Potato sets, treated before planting with thimet, for the control of aphids and leafhoppers on the growing plants, gave promising results. Control of aphids and mites on lima and snap beans by the use of thimet gave excellent results. Dusting onion sets with thimet controlled thrips on the growing onions.

HOOP FILMS

THE 1956 SEASON
The coming season will see many further experiments with this new systemic insecticide. The United States Department of Agriculture is recommending limited grower trials next year. It has been estimated that the cost of treating seed with the chemical will amount to about \$3.00 per acre at present prices. Thimet will only be available at present as thimet treated seed. Individual growers will not be able to secure it to treat their own seed until it has been thoroughly tested, by the Experimental Stations.

Thimet may prove to be a great step forward in controlling the most difficult insects that our growers have to fight, those that live by sucking the juices of plants and escape injury from the surface application of insect poisons.

Driver Injured In Accident

A 1952 half-ton Fargo truck, driven by Truman Jeffery, Summerside went out of control at Ross' Corner Thursday afternoon about 5:30 while proceeding toward Summerside and ended up in the ditch on its right side, on the opposite side of the road. Mr. Jeffery sustained slight injury to his right hip but the other two occupants were uninjured.

The accident occurred at the same ice-laden spot where Ralph Belmont of Moncton was seriously injured last Saturday night and the truck came to rest just a few feet from where the car had landed on its top. In both cases oncoming vehicles necessitated pulling over to the side where the vehicles went out of control on the rutted ice.

Mr. Jeffery's truck received damage to the right side and to both fenders.
