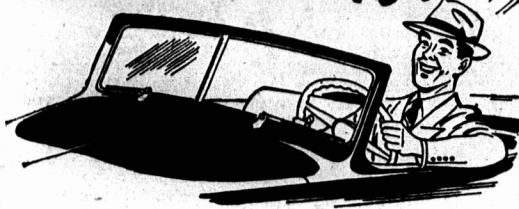


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NOTICE

TO DOG OWNERS

The following sections from the By-Law relative to Dogs and the taxing thereof are as follows:

Section 9 Subsection A: No person shall permit his dog or bitch to be on any street without a collar and attached thereto the tag issued by the Department showing that the tax has been paid for the current year.

Section 9 Subsection B: No person shall allow his dog or bitch to be at large on or about the streets of the said city.

Section 9 Subsection C: Any dog or bitch which shall be on or about the streets of the said City and shall not be in the immediate company of, or under the reasonable control of its owner, or some competent person, shall be deemed to be at large.

The services of a dog catcher have been employed in the enforcement of this By-Law, and any dog found at large and taken will be impounded and delivered to the owner on payment of \$2.00 forfeit and subject to any prosecution for infraction of this By-Law. Any dog unclaimed after a reasonable period will be destroyed. PLEASE NOTE that if the impounded dog is without a collar and tag attached there will be no way of knowing who the owner may be.

are represented in the 191 Canadian nominations for early closing events at Saratoga Raceway, New York. Most of the nominations are from Ontario. The one Nova Scotia nomination is B. C. Cruickshank of Halifax, whose star performer is Brewer's Galton 206 1-5, a recent winner in the Joe O'Brien stable at Santa Anita, Cal.

Clint Hodgins, Canadian Reinsman who won \$184,108 in purses on the sulky circuit last year, set an all time money winning record. The second biggest single year winner is Frank Erwin of Aiken, S. C., who topped \$183,656 in purses last year.

Sixteen pacers and four trotters will start the 1950 harness racing campaign with records of 2:00 or better to their credit. One of them, Lorraine, owned by W. N. Reynolds, earned a pacing mark of 1:59 last year but will be back on the trot this season. Proximately, owned by Ralph Verhurst of Victor, N. Y., that was sold to them for \$500, a few years ago and turned out to be one of the world's greatest trotters, won 20 of 28 heats last season and is out for further honors this year.

The Horsemen and Fair World has launched a campaign to transfer the remains of "the horse that time forgot", Single G. 1:58 1-2, from the Float Jolly Farm in Tip-top, Indiana, to Cambridge City, Indiana, and to erect a monument to his greatness at the new grave. Single G. started racing as a two-year-old and in his fourteen years campaigning won 262 heats. He died in 1940.

Notwithstanding the tremendous purses which are being raced for today, Goldsmith Maid that raced from 1865 to 1877 is still recognized as the biggest money winning harness horse of all time with earnings totalling \$206,462. Also a notable fact is that in her 20th year she equaled her then world's record of 2:14 to hulk wheeled sulky. Next to Goldsmith Maid in total earnings is Proximately, that has earned \$160,204 and this season, as we remarked before, is out again to win further honors.

Greyhound, holder of the world's trotting record of 1:55 1-4, won 85 of 86 heats trotted during his five years racing from 1894 to 1898, and he was only once out of the money. In his last two seasons he was unbeaten and was selected as horse of the year in 1938 from trotters, pacers and thoroughbreds. Greyhound The Grey Ghost, a gelding, brought \$900 as a yearling. He is still living in luxurious quarters at the home of his owner, Colonel E. J. Baker, St. Charles, Illinois. Greyhound's dam, Elizabeth, is out of Zombrower 2:04 by Zombro. Zombrower is also the dam of Peter the Brewer 2:02 1-2, the sire of Calumet Budlong 2:02 3-4, owned by Frank McKay East Royal, Ia.

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Patrick Quits Rangers To Coach Father's Team

NEW YORK, May 5 — (CP) — Lynn Patrick, member of one of the best-known families in the hockey world, today left his coaching job with New York Rangers to take up a similar post on the other side of the continent with Victoria Cougars of the Pacific Coast League.

Patrick, who has been coach of the National Hockey League club here since December, 1948, is heading for British Columbia to join his famous father, Lester, in operating the Victoria team in the coast circuit.

Lynn took Rangers to the finals of the Stanley Cup playoffs in the N. H. L. season just ended. He and his father are part-owners of the Cougars.

Announcing his trans-continental move, the younger Patrick said one reason "is that I would prefer to rear my family in some place other than a big city."

A third child, a son, was born to the Lynn Patricks last week. They already have one son, 4, and a daughter 2.

Gen. John Reed Kilpatrick, president of Madison Square Garden Corporation which owns the Rangers, said: "No successor to Lynn is in sight." He added he was "naturally disappointed" to lose the coach, saying Lynn "has done a splendid job for us."

Patrick was no stranger to Rangers when he took over as coach 17 months ago. For 11 years he was a star left-winger for the team. He coached New Haven Ramblers of the American Hockey League for 2 1-2 years before moving to the New York team.

His move to Victoria takes him into a circuit which was launched by members of the Patrick clan in 1911. Lester Patrick, along with Lester's father, Joseph, and Lester's brother Frank, organized the

didn't make a meal for the hawk.

Don't think for a moment that a Goshawk couldn't kill a hen pheasant, and I imagine they'd give an old Cock a run for his money.

This spring a farmer sportsman at Orwell Cove told me three years ago he had a pair of Goshawks nesting in his hardwoods across the creek. He believed in live and let live and decided he wouldn't disturb them providing they left his chickens alone. Although he knew the location of the nest, just before supper one evening he heard a black duck that had a nest along the creek quacking in a terrified manner with her quacks growing fainter and fainter until they faded out altogether. After supper he shouldered his shotgun and headed for the nest. He shot one of the hawks and forthwith took out his pocket knife and opened its gullet. Sure enough he found the evidence he suspected—small chunks of freshly killed black duck in the gullet and stomach. He got the other hawk the following morning.

Not long ago I found where a Ruffed grouse had met an untimely end at Crown Point. I had been past the same spot only a few days before and there was no sign of trouble. I hate to see where a Ruffed grouse is killed more so than either a Hun or pheasant. In comparison with those two species the grouse is relatively scarce and every one killed in the breeding season is a distinct loss and one that is noticed.

On Thursday afternoon this past week Bruce Wright, Ducks Unlimited representative, Frederickton, N. B. and myself were checking a woodcock cover at Avondale. Woodcock signs were encouragingly numerous but we did find where a woodcock nest had been raided. Two eggs only had been laid before the nest was destroyed, presumably by a skunk. Woodcock as a rule lay four and this particular bird undoubtedly set up house-keeping in a new location. Providing houses are also taken a heavy toll of this species of game bird.

Sportsmen can do their bit, like the Pownal hunter, toward cutting down on predators. Anyone who knows of the location of a horned owl or Goshawk nest would be doing their good turn for the season if they accounted for the nest and its occupants. Every mother black duck, Hun, pheasant or Ruffed grouse killed from now on may mean anywhere from 8 or 9 to twenty or more birds less in the fall... and that's more than the average hunter bags in a season.

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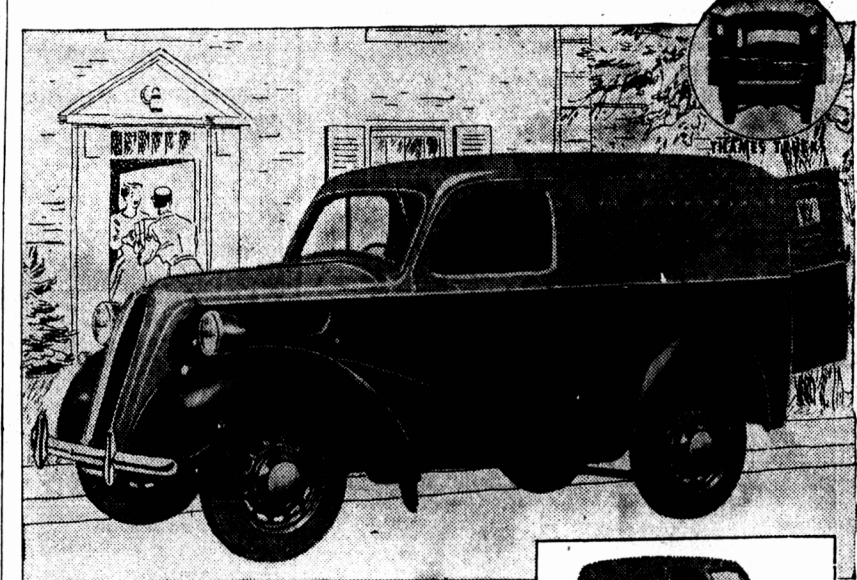
REMEMBER WHEN
