

Elizabeth, Like Victoria, Queen In Own Right

Britons Say She Has Same Qualities For Winning Affection Of People

LONDON — (NEA) — Victoria was probably the best-loved monarch Great Britain ever had, and she ruled for the longest time.

Elizabeth, the new Queen, ascends the throne already assured of a warm place in the hearts of her subjects. Whether she will ever match Victoria as a revered Queen is a matter for history to decide.

But Britons see in her the same qualities for winning affection that Victoria had. She has respect for her people. She is a quiet, family-loving woman, a person of great dignity and honor.

She was carefully trained as a future queen. She never slept away from her mother, and she was forbidden to talk to grown-ups alone. These rigid measures made her an unchildlike child, and gave her a dignity that was consistent with her position.

In 1837, when Victoria was 18, she became queen. The chamberlain awoke her in the early morning and calmly spoke the words she knew she would one day hear: "Your Majesty!" She was Queen Victoria.

Thus began a reign that was as different from the original Elizabeth's as it is from the reign that the new Queen will have. Whereas Elizabethan England was a period of loose carousing, Victorian England was straight-laced and severe.

But both eras were golden days for England. Under Victoria—and her brilliant prime ministers, Palmerston, Gladstone, Disraeli—England's expansion reached its peak. The nation became an empire, with the addition of India, and Victoria became an empress. The new queen will not have that title on her string.

Next to her country, Victoria's abiding love was her family. Her consort, Albert, and her children—she had nine, including the future King Edward VII—made up a closely-knit happy circle.

The marriage of Victoria and Albert was an arranged union. Albert had been carefully coached for the job of a future consort. The happiness of the marriage came after it was a fact, and blossomed with the years. Albert's death, when Victoria was 42, was a heavy blow.

It is here that the present Queen differs most from Victoria.

Her marriage was a love match. Philip and Elizabeth met when she was 13 and he 17. The Royal family was visiting the Royal Naval College, and Philip as "Captain's Doggie," had to entertain the two princesses while the King was inspecting.

It's difficult to say that love came at once to a 13-year-old girl, but if it wasn't love at least it was close friendship and admiration. Love came later and open-minded George VI let Elizabeth choose her own husband. Her choice was Philip.

Elizabeth's training for her future role was just as intense, although not as firm, as Victoria's. Her grandmother, the Dowager Queen Mary, was a kindly teacher in the ways of queenship. Once Mary introduced her to an old friend, who greeted her, "How do you do, Lady Elizabeth."

The child princess stiffened and said, "It's Princess, not Lady." Her grandmother spoke up quickly, "Yes, it's only princess now, but we are hoping when she grows up she will be a lady."

Through the tutoring of the Dowager Queen and Queen Elizabeth, the princess did grow into a lady worthy of the name. Her

graciousness on her tour of Canada last October won her the respect of all who met her. Shortly after becoming Queen, Victoria wrote: "I have so many communications from the ministers, and from me to them, and I get so many papers to sign every day, that I always have a very great deal to do. I delight in this work."

The new queen was equally zealous as she trained for the day that arrived with her father's death. When she was 18, she made her debut in the ceremonial role which is the biggest part of the royal family's work.

She reviewed the guard at Windsor Castle. Afterwards, she went to her father and asked, anxiously, "How did I do, Daddy?"

The King tapped a cigarette against his case and smiled at his eager daughter. "Very well, my girl," he said. And throughout Great Britain and the dominions across the seas, the prayer and the expectation are that Elizabeth will continue to do very well. With the model of Victoria shining from the history books she studied so carefully, Britain believes that she will.

Economical Meals

How much bread and cereal does your family eat in one month? According to Canada's Dietary Standard a family of five with children aged two, six and ten may eat approximately 21 lbs. of flour and cereal and 47 lbs. or 38 loaves of bread. These amounts form a substantial part of the food bill.

Cereals and bread are burned in our body to give carbon dioxide and water, at the same time producing heat or energy. However, in order for this action to take place Vitamin B1 or thiamine must be present. It is found in the bran and germ of the whole grain. The more bread and cereal we eat the more Vitamin B1 we need. This is why Canada's Food Rules tell us to use whole grain cereals every day.

Can we economize on cereals? At present prices it is possible for the family of five to buy a month's supply of white and graham flour, package rice, macaroni, cornstarch, cornmeal, oatmeal and prepared cereals for around \$3.80. However, with a little care these same amounts can be bought for only \$1.95 — almost one half as much.

This is done by buying rolled oats in the bag rather than in packages, by buying rice, macaroni and cornmeal in bulk (cellulose bags) instead of in packages, and by buying oatmeal, cracked and rolled wheat instead of fancy package cereals.

Oatmeal and wheat have from two to three times as much Vitamin B1 as shredded wheat, bran flakes, shreds and muffets; white cornflakes, rice krispies, puffed rice and puffed wheat have practically no Vitamin B1 and cost about six times as much as oatmeal.

What about bread? 38 loaves of white bread at 17c a loaf will cost \$6.46. 38 whole wheat loaves made at home 11c a loaf including electricity for cooking, will cost only \$4.13 — a saving of \$2.33.

This together with the saving on cereals will amount to over \$4.00 a month — enough money to buy 24 quarts of milk. Remember, to save money — buy whole grains, buy in bulk, bake at home!
