

Business Office "could get off their ass"

At the beginning of the meeting several senators expressed concern about the recent action of the R.C.M.P. on campus regarding drug searches. It was expressed by Professor Andrew Robb that the R.C.M.P. were not very courteous in their action in that they had not informed the university administration of their actions in particular the chief executive officer. President Baker was out of the province at the time of the searches, but acting President, Dr. Ken Ozmon had not been informed of the R.C.M.P.'s presence either. The director of security had been informed by the R.C.M.P. of their action. In the past the general policy has been that the R.C.M.P. inform the administration that they were coming, and that they didn't come unless on other grounds they are approached.

Micheal Hennessey, the registrar brought to the attention of Senate that New Year's Day being on Saturday, Monday was designated a holiday; and could registration be changed to the 4th and 5th of January, with classes starting on Thursday Jan. 6th, rather than classes beginning on Wed. Jan. 5th, as previously scheduled in the university calendar. The reason for this being that registration takes two days to be completed. Professor Owen Sharkey excused himself but expressed his feelings that the Business office "could get off their ass", and complete registration in one day rather than two. Several other senators wondered if temporarily bonded employees could be brought in for one day to work with the business office, so that registration could be completed in one day. The matter would be looked into.

The Admissions committee submitted recommendations before Senate dealing with the entrance requirements for the University of Prince Edward Island. The first recommendation was that students wishing to enter the Arts faculty must have English 11, Math, and four electives. The previous requirements were that students must have grade 12 academic Math to enter the university. The recommendation was defeated. So grade 12 Math will still be mandatory to enter all faculties at UPEI. The motion

was passed concerning the Science faculty requirements for English, Math, two sciences plus one elective.

The Nominating committee reported a vacancy for a student to serve on the Budget committee. It was moved that Micheal Clow be officially designated as student representative on the committee. President of the Student Union Derek Key, informs Senate of his withdrawal from the nominating committee: so there is a student vacancy on that committee. The Senate library committee also requires one student representative.

Jim Griffith, Director of the Student Services reported to Senate on the council of university life. The council dealt with committees on residences, the dining hall, orientation, etc. Several recommendations were brought to the floor to be voted upon. One was that the council report to

the President on their actions rather than the Senate. Another recommendation was that committees structure be accepted as outlined. The standing committees would include the S.J.C. formerly a Student Union Committee, the parking and traffic committee and nominating committee both former committees under senate jurisdiction, residences, orientation, and dining hall.

Since several senators did not have a report on the council of university life, and also that it was getting late, and many Senators were leaving, further discussion on the Council on University Life was tabled.

Derek Key's motion was brought to the floor concerning residences. It stipulates that students upon applying for residence must submit fifty dollars along with their application, this would acknowledge their sincerity in applying for residence. Previously there

has been no application fee. If accepted into residence the money would then be put toward the students residence fees. A twenty-five dollar refund would be given back to the student before August 15th when applying in the first semester for residence. This is only in the case that a student does not wish to live in residence at the university. Senate felt that Key's motion was not in their jurisdiction, but would be presented to the Board of Governors.

Senator Gary Webster expressed his feelings that under no circumstances should Senate meetings be cancelled due to the Chairman and Vice-chairman being out of the Province. The motion was passed that the Senior Dean should act as chairman of Senate if this problem should ever arise again.

The Senate will meet again at 3 p.m. in the Board Room of Kelly Building on Thursday December the Second.
