LeClerc Is Star As Hawks Defeat Ramblers 3-1

MONCTON (CP)—Centre Jean LeClerc scored the first goal and set up two others for winger Bob Bowness here Wednesday night as Moncton Hawks downed Amherst Ramblers 3-1 and regain title of Fredericton Capitals in top spot of the Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League.

Hawks' goalie Nick Pidsodny kicked out 30 shots, most of them point blank range. The only Amherst goal, by Dave Kiley in the second period, was a screen shot through a maze of players.

The Hawks opened scoring at 15:49 of the opener when LeClerc crashed a loose puck at centre ice, outpaced playing coach Lou Kiley of Ramblers and slipped a low drive into the left corner.

Kiley tied the count at 2:37 of the second period with a backhand shot.

Bowness got the only goal of the last period on a pattern play with LeClerc and Mike Demchuk at 15:58.

We think, regardless of what is to happen or not happen, at least, the matter should be made clear to the Summerside people. Surely the powers-that-be owe them that courtesy. If we are not to get any further help from the physical fitness department in the way of a full-time or part-time supervisor, why hasn't the matter been fully explained to us? A statement explaining the necessity for this curtailment of sports activities by the department seems to be overdue.

There is a lot of first-rate hockey material in the town at present, and most of them may have departed by the time for natural ice rolls around. Ron McArthur seems a fixture here this winter, and so far, Paul Schurman hasn't expressed any desire to roam. Vance Harter may play some place on the mainland, and it is also doubtful whether the "Little Beaver", Syl Bernard will hibernate in Summerside. Mary Delaney, who suffered the serious accident in Ontario last spring, is in town, and report has it that Mark has already played some hockey. If he is really fit, and intends staying in the town, it would certainly give our chances for a good team here a considerable boost. Garth Gay, the "Ace" ace defenceman, is expected to don a Summerside uniform again this winter.

Boston Defeats Chicago 4-3 To Move From Cellar

BOSTON (AP)—Boston centre Fleming Mackell intercepted a Chicago passout in the third period and whipped a 10-foot shot past Black Hawks goalie Al Rollins Wednesday night for a 4-3 victory that pulled the Bruins out of the National Hockey League cellar.

It was Mackell's second goal of the game. He took a pass from Chicago's Johnny McCormack in the Chicago end and soled in on Rollins.

The Boston win moved Bruins into fifth place and dropped Hawks into the cellar. Boston, who held a 3-0 lead in the first period, saw Chicago tie the score in the second.

Doug Mohns, Mackell and Ed Sandford got Bruins off to the 3-0 start. Pete Conacher got the first of two goals late in the first period. In the second McCormack fired a screened shot and was followed by Conacher's second tally.

CHICAGO (AP)—Eight American cities are expected to extend bids for the 1960 Olympic Games before a selection group of the United States Olympic Committee meeting here next Tuesday and Wednesday.

The 1960 Games will be in Melbourne, Australia.

Chicago, Detroit, Los Angeles, Philadelphia, New York, Minneapolis, Pittsburgh and Houston are reported interested in landing the 1960 Games.

In addition, Colorado Springs and Aspen, Colo., jointly, and Lake Placid, N. Y., and Sun Valley, Idaho, seek the winter phase of the 1960 Games.

K. L. Wilson, U. S. Olympic committee president, said the American city finally selected will send a representative to the International Olympic Committee meeting in Paris next April to bid against cities of other countries.

Probe Constable's Death At Toronto Football Game

TORONTO (CP)—A woman spectator said Wednesday she saw a man charged with obstructing police remove a constable's hat and toss it into a crowd.

The incident occurred at Varsity Stadium Oct. 23 during a melee following a football game. Constable James Cowie, whose hat was involved, died of a heart attack resulting from exertion.

Mrs. Mary Ann Sheridan testified at a special hearing into charges of police brutality in connection with the incident. They were made by Robert Wright, 21, and Michael Griffin, 22, who were charged with obstruction of police.

The woman said she saw Wright throw the hat while Cowie was leading him away. She described him as "a drunk" charged against Wright and Griffin have not been heard.

A constable who was accused of beating Wright Wednesday denied the charge when questioned by Mr. Justice W. D. Roach.

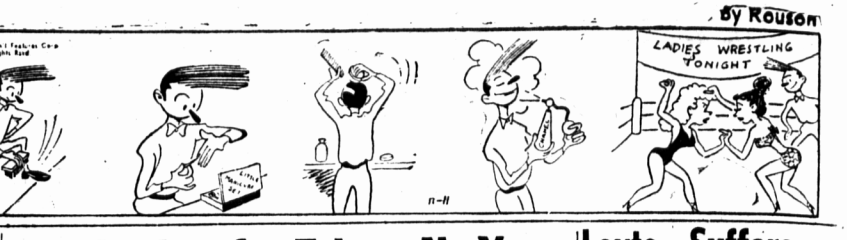
Constable William Chamberlain denied he hit or kicked Wright. He said Wright attacked him with a chair and he forced Wright to the floor.
