A SOMNAMBULIST'S DEATH.—An Iogerec! Ont., despatch says: A Bell Telephone lineman named John Padfield, of London, fell out of a third story window of the Bailey House between 11 and 12 o'clock last night and sustained serious injuries. His left leg and left arm were fractured and his face and the upper part of the body were painfully bruised. It is not known yet whether he has suffered any internal injuries. A passer by noticed him lying on the sidewalk in an unconscious state and gave the alarm. It is supposed that the unfortunate man, while dreaming, got up, partially dressed himself, went to the window of his room and jumped out.

MILITARY FUNERAL.—The funeral of the late Sapper John Dover took place yesterday afternoon, and was under military auspices. There was a large turnout of the military, with the Artillery Band. The attendance of citizens generally was also large. The streets along the route were well lined with people. The floral tributes included an anchor from Mr. John Coombs and his employers where a brother of the deceased is engaged a wreath from the fellow-employees of the deceased in Mark Wright & Co's. establishment, and a crescent from the Engineers corps.

BUTTER, CHEESE AND EGGS.

For butter the demand from shippers today is only fair, but holders do not show the least desire to stimulate business at the cost of prices and to all bids of less than 19 1/2 cents turn a deaf ear. Advices from the Old Country seem at the moment to justify the buoyant feeling. In New York strictly fancy held creamery is commanding 18c and most holders are very steady at that, some choice goods there are, however, obtainable at 17c to 17 1/2c.

The cheese market is excited and somewhat unsettled. At Brockville yesterday 10c was cheerfully paid for white, and 10 1/2 for colored, but on spot today buyers are chary about paying even 10c, and can certainly do business at that. This peculiarity is partially explained by the fact that the cheese bought in the country during the past two days has not arrived here yet. In New York yesterday there was a fair demand from exporters for large full cream cheese, and prices were firmly established at 9 1/2 for the finest grades.

Advices from Liverpool and Glasgow are very satisfactory this morning, quoting 7s per long hundred, and shippers here are looking about eagerly for stock suitable for export and when fully satisfied as to quality, willingly bid 12c to 12 1/2c, a fractional advance over prices current here yesterday. Eggs to meet with favor on the other side of the Atlantic must weigh 1 1/2 lb per dozen; this is a very important factor. Ordinary No. 1 stock is in fair domestic demand at 11c, and No. 2 are selling at 9c to 9 1/2c.—Montreal Star, August 27.
