A Terrible Battle in Egypt.

EIGHT HUNDRED ARABS KILLED.

BRITISH LOSS 65!

LONDON, Jan. 21. Its officially reported that serious fighting has occurred in Egypt, and that the result was satisfactory to Lord Wolseley.

LATER.

The battle occurred near Metemneh. An army of 10,000 rebels attacked a square, in which the British forces were advancing, several times, but were compelled to retire.
