## Cook's Corner

### GRAPEFRUIT SHORTCAKE

1 1/4 cups all-purpose flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 6 tablespoons milk, 1 1/2 tablespoons flour, pinch of salt, 3 small tablespoons, 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder, 3 tablespoons shortening, 1/2 cup butter, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla, 2 tablespoons chopped maraschino cherries.

Sift flour, measure 1 1/4 cups, rest sift three times with baking powder and salt. Cut in shortening, add milk. Stir vigorously until stiffened. Divide into two parts and roll each into 7-inch circle 3/8 inch thick. Place first portion on baking sheet; brush with melted butter and cover with second portion. Bake in hot oven, 425 degrees F. 20 minutes, or until nicely browned. Peel and section grapefruit, cut in small pieces; drain off juice (should be 1/2 cup); if not, add water. Melt butter, stir in flour (1 1/2 tablespoons) until smooth; add sugar, salt, grapefruit juice. Cook sauce until it boils and thickens. Remove from heat, add vanilla. When ready to serve, break open shortcake, cover with half of grapefruit and sauce; replace top and cover with remaining fruit and sauce. Sprinkle with chopped cherries. Serve hot or cold.

**Bearnaise Sauce** - To Hollandaise Sauce add 1 teaspoon onion juice, 1 teaspoon each chopped tarragon and parsley, and 1 tablespoon tarragon vinegar. Serve with broiled or baked fish.

## How Can I!!!

Q. How can I easily clean soiled spots on wall paper?

Q. How can I renew old rayeled yarn?  
A. Rayeled yarn can be made to look like new by wrapping it in a towel and then placing it for a short time in a colander or a steamer over a vessel of hot water.  
Q. How can I prevent odor when cooking cauliflower?  
A. Place a piece of stale bread on top of the cauliflower, after preparing it for boiling in the usual manner. Don't cover it. When done, remove the bread.
