

Saints Wobble Through 3-2 Win Over Montague

St. Dussan's University hockey squad made Gaston Roy's second period goal stand up for the last 33 minutes of play as they held on to wobble through to a 3-2 victory over the Montague Primroses in a fast and furious Island Senior League game at the Sports Arena last night.

The much improved Primroses had the Saints reeling in a scorching third period and with a little more than a minute of play remaining Bobby Dowling yanked goaltender Gene Ward from the nets, but, although the Saints had one man in the penalty box during the last minute and two men for the last seven seconds, Montague was not able to penetrate through the magical netminding of Will Gillis in the S. D. U. cage.

OPENS FAST

The fans got a good indication of things to come when the first period opened with a rush but neither team could get puck into the net until Buck Davey, playing a smart game for the Saints, orke the ice at 18:47. Davey fought off two Montague players for possession of the puck after he took a pass from linemate Ed MacDonald inside the Montague blueline, and beat Ward from directly in front of the net.

That was the only score of the period but the Primroses enjoyed a 13-4 shooting edge in the period and narrowly missed on more than one occasion.

At 4:10 of the second Jack MacDonald put the Saints 2 goals up when he grabbed a loose puck in front of Montague cage as defenseman George MacDonald was trying to cover up on the play and gave Ward little chance on it.

Two minutes later Dick Carroll got the Primroses in the game as he was on the payoff end of a passing play with Billy Hughes and George MacDonald. MacDonald started the play as he carried from his own blueline. He relayed to Hughes at the defense and Billy sent Carroll right in on Gillis with a perfect pass.

At the time of Carroll's goal Limeaux of S. D. U. was serving time in the penalty box and when Roy notched the goal that proved to be the winner a minute and 37 seconds later Billy Hughes was sitting out a hooking penalty.

Roy finished off a Saints' gangling attack as he got possession of the puck behind the Montague net and slipped in front to hook it into the corner.

Coach Dowling, who put a lot of zing into Montague's attack, in the first game in which he has control of the team, got the final goal of the game at 11:36 of the second as he took Hughes' pass from the corner in the Saints zone and fooled Gillis neatly.

The third period had the fans hanging on to their seats as play raged from one end of the rink to the other. The Primroses had to play two men short for about 10 seconds when Landry was followed to the penalty box by MacRae and Jack MacDonald's try on the rebound bounced off the post.

It was a spine tingling finish when the Primroses played six men on the firing line but it just wasn't their night. In the dying

seconds Dave MacLeod almost got through the Saints' defense on a spectacular rush from his own end, but he was taken out of the play before he could get his shot away. Cuddy Gregory grabbed the loose puck but Gillis brought the fans to their feet when he made the most sensational stop of the night. **CHIT-CHAT**... The Primroses looked like a new team against the Saints... They won't be a push-over for any team in the league... The standout star of the game was undoubtedly Gillis but a couple of others deserve honorable mention... notably Billy Hughes and George MacDonald of Montague and Davey of the Saints... Dick Carroll had a lot of tough luck around the Saints' net as he whizzed shots by the post... Detroit Lions Choose Tracy

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Detroit Lions chose Tom (The Bomb) Tracy of Tennessee in the National Football League draft Sunday night even though the backfield played for Ottawa Rough Riders of the Interprovincial Rugby Football Union last season.

Tracy's name was one of those read by NFL commissioner Bert Bell before the start of Tuesday night's draft in a list of players understood to have signed with Canadian clubs. It was not clear immediately whether the NFL would sanction a Detroit effort to take Tracy from the Riders, who signed him a year before he was due to graduate from Tennessee.

Bell's reading of the list marked a step forward in U.S.-Canadian professional football relations. Last year, when no such list was read, NFL clubs drafted several players under contract to Canadian clubs. A few such cases ended in the courts when a player was signed by competing U.S. and Canadian clubs.

The list read by Bell included Tracy, Calvin Jones of Iowa, Bob Bartholomew of Wake Forest and Doug Peters, Rommie Loud and Bob Davenport of UCLA.

Loud and Peters have signed with British Columbia Lions of the Western Interprovincial Football Union. Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the W.F.U. have announced signing Davenport and have been reported dickering with Jones although his signing has not been announced. Montreal Alouettes of the Big Four have signed Bartholomew.

It was not known immediately which Canadian club had signed Jones although there have been reports that Winnipeg has been negotiating with the Iowa guard. Officials of several Canadian teams have not made their signings public.

Heavy Penalties Levied As Capitals Outscore Beavers

FREDERICTON (CP) — Fredericton Capitals outscored the leading Saint John Beavers 7-4 Tuesday night in an Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey league fixture enlivened by fighting and heavy penalties in the third period.

After a 1-1 opening frame, Caps led 5-2 at the end of the second—enough for the win.

Jackie Hamilton tallied first but it was squared by Fredericton's John Leclerc. Doug McPhee, playing coach Hughie Campbell, Bob Leger and Frank Dorrington scored second period goals for Caps against one by Nick Nicolie.

Bernie MacDonald shot two quick tallies early in the third, both helped by Dorrington and Leclerc. Nicolie figured in a final Saint John brace, scoring after he helped Mark Bolleau.

The fighting started between Bolleau and McIntosh. About eight minutes later McPhee and Lloyd Hinchberger started mixing it up. Then Joe Lepine, Cap defenceman, jockeyed the fray. Hinchberger got a double major and the others majors. Playing coaches Campbell and Steve Brklacich received mis-

conducts for leaving their bench to take part in the argument.

After the game, league president Jack Fenety announced \$15 fines for Hinchberger, Brklacich and Campbell, in the latter two cases for coming onto the ice. Hinchberger's double major automatically constituted a misconduct.

A possible \$75 fine against the teams, for players leaving their benches under such circumstances, was not enforced.

Fenety said the league intended to crack down on all unnecessary roughness.

Bobsled Battle Shaping Up Between Italians - Americans

CORTINA d'AMPEZZO, Italy. (AP)—A battle between the Italians and the underdog Americans for the 1956 Olympic bobsled gold medals began shaping up Tuesday.

Favored by colder weather than Cortina has had in some time, bobsledders from 12 nations took their first official trial runs down the 1,700 metre (one mile, 200 yards) track Tuesday in preparation for the winter games which start Jan. 26.

When the tests were over, everyone knew the Italians were the boys to beat—at least in the two-man event. They have the big advantage of knowing the Cortina run the way you know that slip-

pery spot on your front sidewalk.

FASTEST TIME

Italy's No. 1 daredevil is a former national champion skier, Eugenio Monti, who turned to bobsledding when injuries slowed him down on skis. He turned in the fastest time Tuesday, whizzing his two-man sled down the course in the record-breaking time of 1:22.88 the second of his two heats.

Bobsledding continued to be the dominant practice event but skiers and skaters are coming in fast. Arrivals of many of the teams have been delayed by the lack of snow for practice here and by competition in pre-Olympic international events elsewhere in Europe.

This afternoon 37 Russian and Nordic combined skiers, including world champion Vladimir Kuzin, were welcomed at Cortina's little railroad station. They had suddenly left Andermatt, Switzerland, where they had been tentatively entered in a 12-nation Nordic ski tournament starting Thursday.

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
