DAIRYING IN P. E. ISLAND.

Annual Meeting of the P. E. Island Dairying Association.

The annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Dairying Association was held on Thursday, in the B. I. S. hall.

GENTLEMEN.—At the close of the first year of our Dairy Association, it is my privilege to congratulate you on the successful operations of the past season.

The prices realized for our dairy products have been very satisfactory to patrons, and have to a large extent made up the deficiency for the export remuneration received for our other farm products.

Our co-operative dairying industry during the eight years of its existence has prospered beyond our most sanguine expectations, and is now becoming the mainstay of our farmers.

A great many of our patrons have still much to learn with respect to the proper care of their cows during the winter season.

More attention should be paid to securing the most profitable cows for dairying purposes, which give good returns as milkers, and that when too old to keep for dairy purposes or from other reasons are not profitable as milkers, will be suitable beef.

Great care is also necessary in the feed given to cows and the places where they are allowed to graze—swamp and marsh grasses often give the milk a flavor which unfits it for butter or cheese making.

With respect to the work of our Board during the year I refer you to the report of our very efficient Secretary. I may say that we secured the services of Mr. Fraser T. Morrow as Instructor and Inspector for the term commencing June 1st and ending December 31st, after which he was continued for two months.

Our Dairymen's Board of Trade, which was organized last summer and in operation throughout the season, was a decided help in the marketing of cheese as by arranging the quotations of the English markets of the day previous to our meeting, and the salesmen were in a position to know what offers to accept.

Our term of office will now come to a close, and we hope that our successors will be in a better position than the present Board were when the business was placed in their hands and that increasing prosperity may attend our dairying industry.

The Secretary-Treasurer then gave his report of the business of the association, its organization and work up to the present time. It was an able and exhaustive document. The receipts for the year amount to \$833.16 and the expenditure to \$815.06.

The Inspector and instructor, Mr. Morrow, read his report giving an account of work done during the year and also giving some valuable suggestions with respect to our dairy business. The number of cheese factories in operation during the season was 34, besides 6 creeries and 2 skimming stations. The inspector found the majority of the factories in good condition, and doing good work.

The election of directors was then proceeded with and the following were the choice: R. Jenkins, Hazelbrook; John Anderson, Kensington; L. McDonald, D. P. Irving, Vernon River; Arthur Simpson, Stanley Bridge; J. P. Brennan, Alberton; James E. McDonald, Cardigan.

LARGE BEAR CAPTURED.

Interesting Episode at East Point — Bruin Shows Fight.

Sir.—At East Point recently an event took place which came near ending disastrously to one of the hunters. Late in the afternoon, Mr. Arthur Arbing, one of the well-to-do young farmers of the vicinity, started to the woods, accompanied by his dog, for the purpose of cutting fire-wood. He had proceeded half a mile, when his suspicions were aroused by the actions of his dog, which was barking and growling in a state of intense excitement.

Proceeding still further Mr. Arbing ascertained that bruin lay concealed in a large thicket. Being unarmed, save for his axe, he immediately went home and aroused the neighborhood. A party was organized, consisting of Messrs. A. Arbing, D. McMillan, F. Cheverie, P. A. Cheverie, J. Strong, P. Whitty, J. E. McDonald and W. Gammon. It being too late to set out that evening they started at daybreak the following morning.

Mr. Strong, who immediately fired, inflicting a wound which merely served to render the already infuriated animal even more furious. Rushing at Mr. Strong, he bore him to the ground, fortunately Mr. P. A. Cheverie at this moment rushed up; but, fearing to fire, lest he should injure Mr. Strong, dealt the bear a tremendous blow on the head with the butt of his gun, which caused him to release his hold on Mr. Strong giving Mr. Cheverie a chance to fire, which he did not time in doing, the bullet entering bruin's heart. Mr. Strong happily escaped with a few slight scratches.
