Lobster Cases At Montague

"Appearing in yesterday's Guardian in a report of cases in Magistrate's Court at Montague for violations of the lobster fishery regulations of P. E. I., was the statement that all defendants pleaded guilty. However, in two cases on the docket defendants charged under Section 7 S.S. (B) of the lobster fishery regulations of P. E. I., which fixes the minimum size for lobsters for this district at 2 1/2 (two and one half) inches body measurement, defendants in each case pleaded not guilty. After evidence was taken in the first case of a resident of Murray Harbour North, the defendant reversed his plea to guilty, and was fined \$25.00 and costs.

In the second case under the same section the defendant produced a lobster gauge which he stated was purchased from a Charlottetown firm, and was supposed to be machined to two and one half inches in length on the canner lobster side of the gauge. The defendant himself had not measured the gauge, he said on questioning by the prosecution. The gauge had been checked by the fishery officers after the defendant had been apprehended for retaining lobsters measuring less than two and one half inches, and the gauge had been found to be less than the required length, and not tapered so that the point forward would reach the gear of the eye socket — the lobsters measured.

After some discussion on the Dominion statutes, the Magistrate, Mr. Joseph W. Macdonald, stipendiary magistrate for King's County, ruled that the law pleaded two and one half inches, and that the responsibility to check the gauge before use rested with the individual using it. He cited cases from preceding years to stress this point. The defendant then reversed his original plea of not guilty, and was fined \$25.00 and costs.
