### OLD SMOKESTACKS.

An Article For Which There Is Always a Demand.

Among the very great variety of things that may be bought at second-hand are smokestacks of iron or of steel. It may be that an establishment puts in a bigger boiler and wants a bigger stack. If it is using a steel or an iron stack, the old one is taken down carefully and a new one set up. The old stack may be sold to a dealer in second-hand boilers and machinery, or the owner may keep it and sell it himself to somebody that wants a second-hand smokestack. If it is sold to a dealer, he may remove it to his own yard, or it may be that the original owner keeps it on his premises until the dealer has sold it. A manufacturer may move from one place to another and sell the old plant, or parts of it. Here would be a second-hand smokestack. Second-hand stacks are bought by various users. It may be that the smokestack of an establishment is worn out and that the boiler is not and that a second-hand stack would last out the life of the boiler. In such a case the user would get a second-hand stack if he could find one suitable. Second-hand stacks may be used with various temporary plants set up by contractors and others. A smokestack may be blown down in a windstorm and the user supply the place of it with one bought second-hand.

A steel or iron stack costs about half as much as a brick stack. A second-hand iron stack costs about half as much as a new one. Stacks of metal are made now usually of steel. The steel used costs now less than wrought iron. There is an increasing use of steel instead of brick stacks. Steel stacks up to 6 and 7 feet in diameter would be classed as portable stacks; larger stacks would be of more or less permanent character. Steel smokestacks are now made up to 18 feet in diameter. Very large smokestacks may be lined with brick.

Second-hand smokestacks up to 2 feet in diameter are likely to be found in stock in the yard of the dealer in second-hand boilers and machinery, and he is likely to have stacks of larger sizes elsewhere. There is always a demand for second-hand smokestacks.—New York Sun.

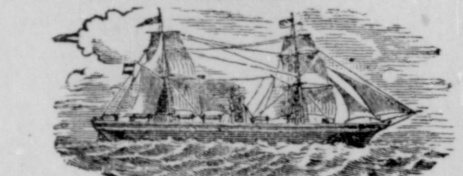

### VULCANIZED RUBBER.

How Charles Goodyear Made the Original Discovery.

It is a bitterly cold night about the year 1840. Around the cracked, unpolished kitchen stove of one of Boston's humblest homes are huddled a man, his wife and family. The surroundings are of the plainest possible. Of furniture there is scarcely a piece that would bring anything at a pawnshop, but of evidence of squalor and want there is abundance. Part of the two remaining chairs has just been broken up to keep the fire from dying out, and as the flames crackle with renewed life the man picks from the floor a dark looking substance and gazes at it with a longing that is pathetic. He holds it up and studies it with many a sigh that cuts the heart of his faithful wife and his loyal children. In changing this substance from one hand to the other it drops upon the hot stove. There is a sudden filling of the room with a pungent, offensive odor before the man, with a startled cry, can snatch the now half scorched substance from the stove. But there is a marked change on the man's face as he examines the burned spots. He feels the substance with a new and intense interest. Is he near the end of years of labor, suffering and disappointment? Thanks to the cold outside, it will not take long to decide. The burned substance is hung outside the door. In an hour the cold has not affected it. In two hours it still retains the properties most desired. In the morning no change has taken place. A great discovery is complete. Charles Goodyear has found the process of making vulcanized rubber.

Here, then, was Goodyear, after years of varying hopes and unvarying ill fortune, in possession of a secret that was destined to place his name in the highest niche of fame. But this knowledge did not bring him immediate fortune—in fact, this he never secured. He had lost the confidence of all who had helped him, and for two years his sufferings surpassed even those of the years of experimenting. At this time he moved to New York, and it was said of him, "If you meet a man who has on an india rubber coat, cap, stock, vest and shoes, with an india rubber purse, without a cent in it, that is Goodyear." He had to pawn all his furniture for food, and he pledged an umbrella with Vanderbilt to secure a few ferry tickets to the city. At last enough money was secured to put his invention on the market, and Goodyear's process very soon made the manufacture of rubber goods one of the principal industries of the world. But although others made immense fortunes out of vulcanized rubber the inventor got little share of it. He went to England and France exhibiting his products. He was awarded the great council medal at the exhibition of all nations at London in 1851, the grand medal of honor to the world's exhibition at Paris in 1855, and was presented with the cross of the Legion of Honor by Napoleon III. Yet with all these honors he died a comparatively poor man at the Fifth Avenue hotel in New York July 1, 1860.—Chicago Post.

### Borrowers of Tobacco.

A wit in this city once said in a newspaper paragraph, "The American people last year used 50,000,000 pounds of chewing tobacco, half of which they borrowed." 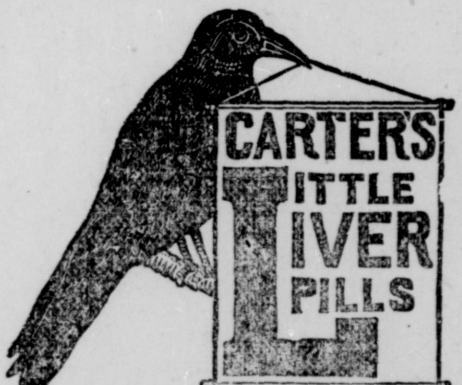

### Curious Policies.

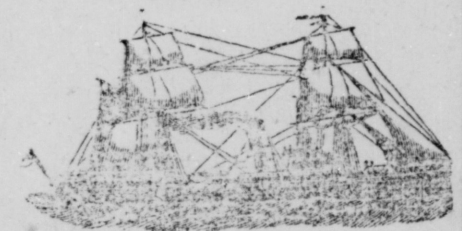
