

# Old Age Security Act Is Now Amended

J.E. Green, regional director of Old Age Security for P.E.I. has released the following statement:

"The Old Age Security Act has been amended to ensure a minimum monthly income of \$105 for all Old Age Security pensioners."

All pensioners who have no income other than the present pension of \$75 per month will qualify for the full \$105 increase. Those who have additional income of less than \$30 per month will receive supplementary payments in lesser amounts, depending on the amount of their present income. Those who have additional income of more than \$30 per month will not qualify for supplementary payments under the new federal program. A minimum of two months will be required to prepare for mass registrations under the Guaranteed Income Supplement (GIS) program. No forms or other supplies could be printed until Parliament approved the amendment to the Act and the Department of National Health and Welfare is now faced with

the necessity of preparing, printing and distributing to the ten regional offices approximately two million registration kits, complete with instructions on registration procedures and an information booklet on the GIS program. It is expected that registration kits will be mailed to all pensioners in this province during the latter part of February, with first payments scheduled to begin in March. Further information on these points will be released to the public as soon as it is possible to prepare a more precise schedule. "It is planned to arrange meetings in various parts of the province during January and February where the Regional Director may speak to interested pensioners and outline the new program to them. In the

meantime the Regional Office staff is preparing itself for the registration of approximately 8,000 pensioners who are expected to benefit under the new program. "Finally, to reassure pensioners on what may be a contentious point, the Regional Office will not be conducting investigations to verify income in the implementation of this program. The Minister of National Health and Welfare has given assurance that the only income verification which will be conducted will be a sampling verification against income-tax returns. This will be to guard against errors and to protect pensioners who may confuse the income test under the new program with the means test under the provincial Old Age Assistance program. For example, the means test included as income such items as gifts of money received from relatives, income from sale of possessions and investments, various kinds of pensions, free board, and so on, whereas under the income test feature of the new program all of these items are excluded. It is worth noting that in the 15 years which have passed since the Old Age Security program was introduced, there has not been a single case of prosecution for fraud in this province. It is expected that the new GIS program will be as successful in this regard as the Old Age Security program has been."
