Stately Ritual. The elder statesman, in a polka-dot bow tie, old fashioned frock coat and zip-fastened shoes, had stood before the 28-year-old Queen. The late afternoon sun shone in through the tall windows as he bent his bulky figure and kissed her hand. Then, in rounded sentences, he spoke of his age and his desire that the leadership of the government should pass to a younger man.

As Churchill handed over his seals of office, a roar sounded outside the palace windows. A helicopter bringing the Queen's husband, the Duke of Edinburgh, home from an out-of-town engagement, landed on the palace lawn. Sir Anthony is expected to be named publicly as Sir Winston's successor Wednesday, one Knight of the Garter thus replacing another in a shuffle that has been awaited with growing impatience, for some 2 1/2 years.

ELECTION STAGE SET. Now the big imponderable of British politics is solved, and the two big political parties, the ruling Conservatives and the Labor opposition, are set for the fourth post-war general election. It is considered a date in late May will be chosen, perhaps May 26.

It is feared the old bogey of the 1945-51 Labor governments—successive balance-of-payments crisis—might recur if Eden decides to wait until the fall.

Tuesday night Churchill met all his senior ministers in the cabinet room of 10 Downing street to say goodbye. He will send a personal letter of farewell to the junior members of his government.

Political life stood still as the news of Churchill's resignation spread. Only 20 members lounged on the green benches of the House of Commons when word reached Parliament. There was a slight melancholy air about the whole building.

Eisenhower In Warm Message To Sir Winston

WASHINGTON (Reuters)—President Eisenhower, in a warm personal message to Sir Winston Churchill on his retirement, said Tuesday he hopes he never will be denied Sir Winston's counsel and advice. Eisenhower spoke in the lovely rose garden of the White House where he and Sir Winston conferred for the last time as heads of their respective governments. Obviously deeply affected, Eisenhower said: "All in the free world can respect your decision to retire from official office to lead a somewhat more serene life than was possible before."

"But I never expect that we shall be denied your counsel and advice out of your great wisdom. Good luck to you in retirement. To you and your family all the happiness that it is possible for you to have."

Eisenhower said that out of Sir Winston's great experience, great wisdom and great courage the free world "yet has much to gain."

good health and in excellent form. Only two prime ministers have served in the job beyond Churchill's age. Lord Palmerston was 81 when he died in office in 1865. William Ewart Gladstone was 83 when he resigned in 1882.

Three Labor party leaders called on Eden this afternoon at the foreign office. Deputy leader Herbert Morrison, Emanuel Shinwell and Hugh Dalton presumably went to pay their respects.

Churchill's retirement ends more than half a century in the political limelight. Although he reverts to an ordinary MP, he will in fact serve as an elder statesman and his voice may still be heard on the great issues of the day.

Friends say Churchill agreed to retire so the Conservatives could fight the election without uncertainty about his future health.

He leaves office with his great ambition unfulfilled—to meet Russia's leaders in a bid to bring permanent peace to the world. Political quarters predicted that from behind the scenes he will still go on working on this dream—even though he would no longer represent Britain at a top-level conference.

One decision before Eden is choice of a successor as foreign secretary. Harold Macmillan, 61, now defence minister, is favored. Another possibility is Selwyn Lloyd, 50, supply minister and an Eden protégé, formerly Eden's deputy at the foreign office.

How New Tax Cuts Work For This Year And Next

OTTAWA (CP)—Canadian taxpayers will not receive the full benefit of Finance Minister Harris' personal income tax cuts until Jan. 1, 1956. He said Tuesday night in his budget speech to the Commons that they will become effective next July 1, meaning taxpayers will pay six months' taxes at the old rate and six months' at the reduced rate.

Mr. Harris estimated that 85 per cent of Canada's 3,000,000 taxpayers will be affected by a tax cut ranging between 12 and 13 per cent. This is how the tax for 1954, 1955 and 1956 works out for persons who are single, married with no dependents and married with two children:
