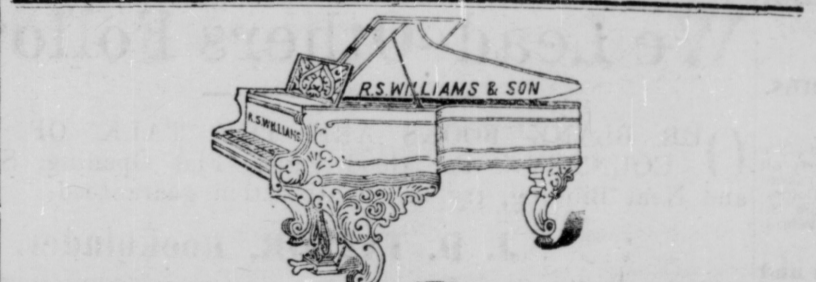

About two thousand persons were on hand in Rustico, Sunday afternoon, to receive the Cardinal when he drove out in company with Bishop McDonald, Father Broderick and Dr. Doyle, from Charlottetown. About eight hundred men were formed in line on the road, and as he drove up the cannon was fired and immediately the Rustico Band struck up an American march, and the procession, headed by the Acadian flag, moved on towards the church.

"The Explorations of Jonathan Oldback, F. G. S. Q., in Eastern Latitudes—Canadian History—Legends—Scenery—Sport," by J. M.
